DISTRICT GOVERNOR BILL BRADFIELD'S MESSAGE

“Recruitment + Retention = Healthy Lions Clubs”

Lions activities are starting to gain new momentum. Since July we have added new members to the following Clubs: Cadillac-4, Mt. Pleasant-9, Harrison-2, Arcadia-40 reactivated plus 5 new, and Lake Ann-17 reactivated. At present we have the highest number of new members reported in all districts statewide!

Due to a false rumor circulating, I want to make it very clear what projects that I support as your Governor. They are Leader Dogs, Paws With A Cause, KidSight, State Band, Michigan Foundation, Bear Lake Camp, Childhood Cancer, Hearing and Speech, Lions Clubs International Foundation, Lions Clubs International Campaign 100, Lions Quest, Michigan Eversight, Sight Conservation and Diabetes, Defense Against Diabetes (DAD), White Cane, and Youth Exchange. Now is the time of the year that we make donations to projects that both create good results and that are needed in the communities that we serve. The ones listed above are good choices as are other charitable projects your clubs have been involved in for years. In addition, is our own Lions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF). Since 2019 LCIF has funded Michigan Projects in the amount of \$616,624.00! This funding included Diabetes Programs, Leader Dogs, Playground for Disabled Children, COVID relief (5 grants), equipment and renovation, flood relief (4 grants), Clothes for Veterans, Feeding the hungry, Food Bank freezer expansion, and Autism Programs. Our District donated only \$7,230.00 in the last year. In the last 3 years LCIF Contributions to Michigan projects was 85 times that amount (\$616,624.00). We can and should do better because every penny of their grants improved the living and health conditions of every community in Michigan. So if we raise a minimum of \$10,000.00 in the next year, we will automatically receive a rebate of \$1,500.00 back to our district.

We are also developing a fundraising guide that will contain information from all clubs in our District. The purpose of the guide will be a reference book for each individual club to use in the development of new and successful fundraisers. This can help improve the fundraising and community interest in each clubs area. It can also possibly increase membership if you notify your communities what the events are. We will be sending out an information request that will require information about the fundraiser. The information we will need is the name (description) of the fundraiser, annual dates of the fundraiser (to keep from duplicating the same type fundraiser on the same date), how many Lions it takes to organize and manage the event, how much is raised, time spent, and contact information

on the Lion in charge of the event. This will also assist us in receiving an annual Award for the most productive District and District Governor.

DAD dollars remaining in our statewide Diabetes Grant are a little over \$30,000. We should have things pretty well complete by the end of the year. The most recent and exciting agreement that we just signed is with District 11E2 and the Mid-Michigan Medical Center in Flint. It is the first of a kind Diabetes Training Program for school systems in Oscoda and Alpena. The total cost of this innovative agreement is \$18,101.64. This is the highest dollar amount in the DAD program so far. LCIF is very interested in doing another video documentary of this project. We congratulate District 11E2 on a job well done.

LCI is asking us all to become Model Clubs for the Campaign 100 project. They have extended the date to June 2022 for each member to raise \$500.00 and June of 2023 for pledges. Just one or two small fundraisers can get you there or just save your refundable pop cans or beer cans. At 7 cans per day starting October 1, you can accomplish this worthy goal. Ask your car dealer or Insurance agent for a donation. How much money have you donated to their coffers in the last ten years?

The recent Car Show organized with volunteers from the Cadillac Lions Club was a success including a nice sunny day. Our Treasurer of District 11E1, Terry Ventocilla, sat under a tent for 5 hours administering Diabetes A1C tests to the spectators. Terry is a first responder and has performed countless tests for Diabetes. Thank you Terry for what you do.

We have been through a very difficult year with COVID at every turn. You will all be known as the Lions of the Pandemic Generation, You are the Fighters, You never gave up, we lost some of our Best Warriors and kept going, You embraced Change and found ways to work around it, You were the Knights of the Needy, and You all continued to serve during a most critical time. **“Let’s Go Lions”!**



When I listen to others explain why they became Lions I find their stories enlightening and inspirational. So many were affected, either themselves or through loved ones, by eyesight issues. It was their desire to help that motivated them to become Lions. I don't have things like that in my past. I became a Lion simply because someone I knew and respected asked me to a meeting. At the time I didn't even really know what Lions Clubs stood for.

I am myopic. I've worn glasses nearly all of my life. I sometimes joke that I couldn't find my rear end with either hand without them. So, at that first meeting I listened with a sympathetic ear and I eventually joined. But even then, I didn't really understand the impact I could have on the lives of others. I volunteered for projects simply because I had the skills and time to take part. Plus, my father had drilled into me that *if you make a promise, you*

better damn well keep it so there was that motivation. As time passed there was no signal event, no "aha" moment, I just slowly came to realize the good that Lions do. Over time my motivation changed from "because I can" to "because I must." For I am one of the fortunate ones - I have sight; I can hear; I don't have diabetes.

Lions Clubs must survive for the next hundred years - that is clear. And so we must replace old members with new. As we "Q-Tips" (visualize that for a minute) age and grow infirm, our vital clubs must have new members or they will pass into nothing. The only way they can flourish is when others are asked to join. And as I see it, therein lies a problem.

For many of us, the "ASK" part is the hard part. It's why some can't sell raffle tickets or stand outside a door during Candy Days. They would rather stick a needle in their eye. (OK, that's a gross exaggeration but you get my meaning.) Asking is really hard for some of us - including me. I really don't know whether it is the fear of rejection or just the nature of asking someone for something - maybe both - but it's difficult.

I won't live forever so I ask myself: If I really value Lionism, don't I have an obligation to help it survive and flourish after I'm gone? Isn't it my duty to ask? I say Lionism is vital but what am I doing to grow it? That is the mantra I use to screw up my courage to ask someone to a meeting. And what's the worst that happens? They say "No." That's it, no more, no less.

I'll let you in on a dismal secret: No one I've ever asked has ended up joining. Nada, Zilch, Zippo. I am batting zero on new members. And I confess that it is hard to keep asking in the face of such dismal results. But the members of my home club keep getting older and more infirm. One-by-one they are becoming less active. It gets harder and harder to find members to fill the volunteer lists. If something doesn't change, our club which once counted 40 members, will fade away.

Truly, there is no one reason why a person joins a Lions Club. Some have a connection to someone in need. Some have a more personal reason. Others join to give back to the community. And some, like myself, join simply because they are asked to join.

It is true that you face possible rejection when you ask someone to a meeting. And for some of us that is a big obstacle. But what if they don't say no? By asking, you could help that potential member find just what they've been looking for. I beg you to screw up your courage and ask someone to a meeting. It's hard. I know. But the future of Lionism is in your hands.

Lions this is the time to remember, we have quite a few clubs celebrating their charter night. Join them. Have fun with the Lions. Our District did so much work and carried on under very trying circumstances. We are not totally done, but we are a lot better. Enjoy our joint accomplishments with each other. Having a good time is as important as working hard. Enjoy each other. I plan on going to as many as I can. I plan on visiting my fellow PDG's appreciation dinners this month. Rickard suggested that the club put two telescopic viewers on the lookouts to give people a better view of the Lake. It was a quarter a view and the first year the club took in 2,000 quarters.



His second suggestion was to turn their club pancake breakfast into a drive through because of the pandemic. They got good results from the drive through and decided to do a free breakfast to help during the pandemic. The community came to the free breakfast and left \$800 in donations. The pancake breakfast continues to be a good fundraiser for the club averaging a \$1,000 a breakfast. Arcadia Lions sponsor Arcadia Days and do a pulled pork

dinner, a BBQ Chicken dinner, and a beer tent. They contribute to the community in many ways. The Lions give out three \$1,500 scholarships to graduates each year.

Rickard grew up in Pontiac, MI and worked in the Pontiac Motor Division. He was a general foreman in the die shop. Rick and his wife Pat moved to Arcadia after he retired in 1982. They have two children and five grandchildren. One of their big adventures was riding a motorcycle to Nova Scotia, 4,100 miles.


