HAPPY NEW YEAR-JANUARY 2022

January starts a new calendar year but, as Lions we celebrate our half way point. How are you as a Lion and a Lion club feeling about the past six months and the next six months? I will say for myself, I have been energized and ready to be up for anything! January is Hunger Awareness Month–one of 5 of our Global causes. January 15th new Peace Poster kits will be on sale.

Melvin Jones' Birthday is January 13th! [The following is taken from lions100.org] Melvin Jones was a dreamer, a doer and a pragmatist. He was an energetic, extroverted salesman who in private hours would reread Shakespeare.

What better man to found the world's largest association of service clubs?

The Lions International Board of Directors officially designated Jones as the founder of Lions Clubs in 1958—more than four decades after Lions Clubs held its first meeting. But, no matter what his official title, Jones' impact on the Lions has been far-reaching. He provided the leadership, the organizational ability, the tenacity and the muscle necessary to establish the foundation for Lions Clubs International to become what it is today.

Jones was born on January 13, 1879 at Fort Thomas, Arizona, a remote U.S. Army cavalry post where his father was a scout for the Army. At age 7, Jones' family moved east and settled in Illinois. Gifted with a fine tenor voice, he considered making his career in music. Instead, he became an insurance salesman.

By 1913, Jones had formed his own insurance agency in Chicago. When he joined a networking luncheon club for businessmen in Chicago called the Business Circle, he quickly took the lead in recruiting new members and persuading backsliders to rejoin. But something about the club's business-only focus didn't square with Jones' different, larger vision.

"What if these men who are successful because of their drive, intelligence and ambition, were to put their talents to work improving their communities?" Jones asked. He saw a new kind of club with the desire to help others.

As Business Club secretary, Jones, with help from his wife—the championship golfer Rose Amanda Freeman—wrote scores of letters to clubs nationwide inviting them to take up his idea for a service-centered organization. Businessman interested in membership convened in Chicago, Illinois, and on June 7, 1917, Lions Clubs International was born. Later that year, at Lions' inaugural convention in Dallas, Texas, Jones was elected secretarytreasurer, a title he would hold for many years. Eventually, the board bestowed upon Jones the title of secretary general for life.

Jones was a prolific writer who could be clear and forceful on some occasions, flowery and sentimental the next. His hand can be seen in founding documents like Lions Club Objects and Code of Ethics. His columns in LION Magazine, which are still quoted today, helped articulate the organization's principles and values. He also loved aphorisms. Never one to sugarcoat the truth, Jones had one favorite saying neatly framed in his office: "Truth and roses have thorns about them."

Jones gave up the insurance business in 1926 to become Lions' de facto CEO and global goodwill ambassador. He played both roles brilliantly–building and managing an expanding headquarters operation and travelling constantly for club visits and speaking engagements. The pace never stopped.

For some strange reason the words are not coming this month. I have struggled with a topic for the newsletter this time. I wasn't able to urge them to visit our club. I lost any opportunity to spread the good word. In short, I took the easy way out and I didn't do my club or Lionism any favors by doing so.

Back to my idea of resolutions. If I had resolved to prepare myself for the uncomfortable task of actually selling raffle tickets, I just might have met a potential member. Really, the only roadblock was me and my natural reluctance to sell the darn things. And if you stop and think about it, we all have something that we avoid even though it benefits our clubs and Lions in general. What's yours - standing at the local supermarket with a canister, riding a Lions float, asking someone you don't know to a meeting, selling?

We all need to make a resolution to do more of the things that make us uncomfortable but need to get done. Whatever it is - more fundraising, more recruiting, more leadership - any of the things that make us better Lions. We will be the better for it. Our club will benefit and so will Lionism. And so I resolve to actually sell tickets to five strangers - even if I have to ask twenty. Hey, buddy! Want to buy a raffle ticket? And by the way, let me tell you about this fantastic organization I belong to.

FREMONT LIONS



Good vision is essential to good learning. Every other year, since 2017, the Fremont Lions working with grants from the Fremont Area Community Foundation and Gerber Foundation and in conjunction with the Ferris State University Michigan College of Optometry, have been running a program called SINE - Students In Need of Eyecare. A very important element of this program is the teachers and staff at Fremont and Hesperia area schools. They identify the children who they

suspect may need help with their vision and then help get the needed paperwork filled out at parent-

teacher conferences or sent home with students and returned. Once identified, these children are transported to the Michigan College of Optometry at Ferris State University where each receives a comprehensive eye exam given by 3rd and 4th year MCO students, working alongside faculty and adjunct faculty who have volunteered their time to supervise them. Following the exams, University Eye Center staff manufacture the glasses and the program coordinator and opticians deliver glasses to each of the students identified as in need during their school day within their respective school.



After each program year, a number of the students examined are identified as also needing follow-up care with an eye care provider or specialist. Some students requiring follow-up care are referred to Fremont Lion and optometrist Dr. Benjamin Sikkenga who was on hand helping with the initial eye exams or other local providers and some are asked to return to the University Eye Center for speciality testing services. Grant funding is utilized to cover follow-up care not otherwise provided by vision or medical insurance.



The extent to which vision plays a critical role in reading and learning was inspiring to alumna Dr. Lindsey Ellicott (O '15), who participated the first two years of the SINE program.

"I really have an interest in pediatric optometry and for those in need," said Ellicott, an Owendale, Mich., native, who used the opportunity to conduct clinical research with a classmate. "I really thought the program benefited so many children. I knew there was a need, but I didn't know to what extent."

Dr. Sarah Hinkley, professor at Ferris MCO and chief of Vision Rehabilitation Services started the program in 2013 and has

coordinated it ever since. The program came about as a project with Mesick Consolidated Schools with support from the Mesick Lions Club, where Sarah's father is a now-retired 6th grade teacher. "Kids need the best chance at educational achievement we can provide. They need to be able to work to their full potential, and this program helps so many children who might otherwise lack access to care," Hinkley said. "Administering a program this large as a volunteer has meant a big commitment by our other faculty to pick up my slack when the program is consuming my time. SINE is evidence of the great spirit of collaboration and innovation we have at MCO. We do great things as individual faculty, staff and students but together we do even more. We have a spirit of giving - of time and talents - in our college that is remarkable."

Despite the work involved in organizing the program and applying for grants to help fund it, Hinkley is thrilled by its success as an educational endeavor for MCO students and as a service to area communities. Her goal is to show optometry students how rewarding it can be to serve their local communities through donations of time and talent so that they implement a service program wherever they end up practicing.

SINE is the biggest and most important project the Fremont Lions run. The Lions donate their time and energy to assist with program organization, partner with the schools and program coordinator, chaperone the event, and work to ensure follow-up care occurs in partnership with the schools. Even though the execution is every other year, there is just as much work in the off years as we work to ensure the follow-up from the previous year is carried out and as we complete the grant preparation for the upcoming program. It is all well worth it. Since its inception, the program has provided 510 eye exams, 347 pairs of eye glasses and an excellent learning experience for over 266 Ferris MCO students. The program is popular with local schools as well, who understand the benefit it can provide to families who might otherwise have difficulty getting their child to eye care.

District Projects

Project KidSight

A Little History on Project KidSight in Midland

After retiring from teaching in June, 2010, I took a year to do nothing but rest and recover. Around May, 2011, Pete Conarty asked me if I would like to work on Project KidSight for our Club. My answer was "YES". I missed being involved in an educational setting and I was excited to get started.

This information is from the Lions of Michigan Foundation website. "Through Project KidSight, we aim to prevent permanent vision loss through the early detection and treatment of vision disorders in children. Screening is done with a high tech camera which is programmed to quickly (1 second) and accurately (90%) identify causes of vision loss without causing stress to children." (LMSF.NET) Our target population is children from age 6 months to 6 years but we also screen older children and even adults on occasion.

To get started for the 2011-2012 school year, I called all the preschool programs in Midland, spoke to the Directors, and tried to schedule screening dates. These are the preschools that accepted our screening services some or all years: Midland Montessori, Midland County Head Start, Early Learning Center (MPS), North Midland Family Center, West Midland Family Center, Midland Community Center, Stepping Stones Preschool, KinderKare, St. John's Episcopal Preschool, and the Early Start program at Bullock Creek Elementary. Later, we added community events such as a tennis shoe give away in 2017, Safety Day at Home Depot, and River Days. We have averaged about 350 children screened per year. We also traveled to other cities in our district where the local Club had a screening opportunity including Greenville, Stanton, Harrison, and Vestaburg.

For the first two years, I was in training. I scheduled the screenings, and then Bob Thompson from the Weidman Club would drive to Midland with a second Weidman Lion and all the equipment. They would do the screenings but they were teaching me along the way. After two years, Bob asked me to take custody of the screening materials and told me I was ready to operate on my own. Then I needed help from our Club members. Sincere appreciation and gratitude go out to the following Lions who volunteered so frequently in the early years: Dick Bukowski, Eldon Dean, Ollie Juengel, Bob Stoney, Roger Frazer, and Dave Heying. There were so many things to do-training, scheduling, and carrying out the screenings-and these dedicated Lions were always available when needed.

When Pete Conarty was District Governor, he encouraged Clubs to purchase Children's books to give to each screened child. Our Club embraced Pete's initiative and as a result, we have distributed approximately 2,100 beautiful books to children. Each person who has ever worked at a screening has enjoyed seeing the delighted reactions of the kids as they go about choosing their book. It's really been a wonderful part of the process.

At some point over the years, most Lions in our Club have helped at a screening and their service is much appreciated. In recent years, Lynda Stark has been getting quite involved in the KidSight work and Lynda will be taking over the reins this year. Many of the screening volunteers have mentioned that they are looking forward to attending screening events and I will be available as needed, as well.

Working on KidSight has given me the opportunity to make many cherished friends, both in our Club and in other Clubs. I am looking forward to helping Lynda get screenings started again as soon as we decide it will be relatively safe to be in the schools around young children.

The Michigan Forum Committee is pleased to announce Sandra Pearson, President and CEO of Habitat for Humanity of Michigan as the keynote speaker for the 2022 Michigan Forum.

Sandra Pearson is the President and Chief Executive Officer of Habitat for Humanity of Michigan, which supports a network of 50+ affiliates and ReStores. A graduate of Michigan State University's Eli Broad College of Business, Sandy began her career in housing with the Michigan State Housing Development Authority (MSHDA) where she spent 16 years working in Civil Rights, Fair Housing, and all federally funded housing programs. In addition, Sandy co-wrote the Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher "Key to Own" Homeownership program to transition people from renting to realizing their dream of owning a home.

In the years she has been with Habitat for Humanity of Michigan, she has provided leadership with housing advocacy both in Michigan and nationally, having served on Habitat International's U.S. Council, Finance and Resource Development council, and National Public Policy committee. She has also served on Michigan coalitions including the Homeownership Study Task Force, Sense of Place Council, Community Development Advisory committee, and was at the table when the Michigan Housing and Community Development Fund was established.
