





MT. PLEASANT LION WRITES AND PUBLISHES A BOOK ABOUT HIS LIFE



Lion Clarence Tuma, a Mt. Pleasant Lion for 62 years, has written a book, THE ONE- POUND PORK CHOP - A Recipe for Life, Love, Family, & The American Dream. Clarence, who is best known as the chef and creator of the one pound pork chop at the Embers Restaurant in Mt. Pleasant, was urged to write his life history by many people including his granddaughter, who transcribed his many written and recorded notes and helped him produce the book. Clarence, who is ninety years old, recalls designing and creating the famous Embers restaurant with his partner, Lion Norm LaBelle. The Embers became the home of the Mt. Pleasant Lions Club for many years.



CADILLAC LION SNOWMOBILES TO FIGHT DISEASE

Cadillac Lion Bill Bradfield, a Vietnam Vet and cancer survivor, was diagnosed with diabetes from the war chemical agent orange. An avid snowmobiler since 1968, Lion Bill decided to put his snowmobiling talents to work raising funds for charitable organizations that fight disease. His first trip in 2010, took him through 5 states, 5 provinces – 22,000 miles, and he raised \$102,000. He has since added wheels to his snowmobile and continues to travel and raise funds mostly for diabetic research and awareness. This year Lion Bill and 62 other riders, did a world tour of 6 countries – 54,000 mile, and raised \$37,00.

MESICK LIONS

Cadet Scout, Alice Dixon, was with her grandparents, Lions Rich and Sheila Ferrel, last May, when their home burned down. The Amercian Red Cross helped and the family was given "comfort bags". Alice decided that she wanted to give back to the Red Cross by donating some goody bags for them to use with other families. She presented a speech to the Mesick Lions Club asking for help with her project. They gave her \$100.00. The Kaleva Lions had sent Lions Rich and Shiela Ferrel a \$50.00 donation to help them with expenses, and they in turn, donated that money to Alice. On November 4, 2015 - the American Red Cross came to a Girl Scout meeting, where Alice presented them with 60 goody bags! Each baggie contained: a bar of soap, wash cloth, tooth brush and tooth paste, deodorant shampoo, razor, shaving cream or women's personal items, and, a nail care kit. The children's baggies also contained a toy. Alice plans to be a Lion in the future and has started TO SERVE.

It is customary for Lions to rise when the governor is introduced and at the end of his/her presentation. Many of our Lions are not aware of this protocol. It is the duty of the president to inform his/her Lions prior to the governor's visit or ask them to stand to greet him/her. Other courtesies are listed on Page 12 of the Roster Book.

LIONS OF MICHIGAN YOUTH EXCHANGE PROGRAM

The Youth Exchange Program has had students visit Australia, Japan, Germany, France, Sweden and Finland, etc. Students do not have to be able to speak a foreign language to go but it is helpful. Host families and Lion Exchange students do not have to be from a Lion family. It is helpful to have a Lions Club support or sponsor a youth but it is not necessary. There are two components to the program for students.

- 1. A U.S. family hosts a foreign student for 4-6 weeks. The family provides a bed, meals, and hospitality. Lions that have hosted a student find that the student becomes part of their lives for years.
- 2. Students from a Lions family but any student with a desire for a cultural exchange, travels to another country from the U.S. This student experiences a 2-4 week camp with other foreign exchange students or lives in a host home in a foreign country.
