Fellow Lions,

Leo Clubs are a potential door to a future of younger Lions in our clubs. Alpha Leos are students in grades 7 to 12. A new Leo club is being formed by Bear Lake club; this means that the community of Bear Lake will have an organized group of young people who want to contribute to their community. In 5 to 10 years, some of these Leos may become Lions, enriching our clubs with youth, vigor, and new ideas. This Leo club and all the other Leo Clubs in our district are Alpha Leo Clubs, which enroll young people under 18. There is another group of young people who could also benefit from the chance to help their communities in an organized way: those over 18 and under 30. These Omega Leos are typically no longer in school; instead they are attempting to establish themselves in their community as family members, church members, and as people earning a living. Their interests and activities are different from those under 18. Worldwide, there is more Omega than Alpha Leos. The beauty of Omega clubs is similar to Alpha clubs - young people learn the satisfaction and fun of contributing to the community without having to pay International, state, or district dues. The Omega clubs have an additional advantage over alpha clubs; members can remain in the club longer. Finally Omega clubs have an additional advantage in that their members are not only eligible to become Lions at any time, they are also more likely to be on the road to financial stability to soon be able to pay Lions dues. If anyone in your club is interested in forming a LEO club, either Alpha or Omega, please contact Laurene Homsher, 231-924-5486 or lhomsher@fremont.net. She will get you started. For more information on starting a Leo Club, look on the District website http://www.milions11e1.org/ under Info and find Manuals for Alpha and Omega Leos as well as a Leo to Lion manual.

Nomination Procedures

Lions who wish to run for a district office (Governor, 1st VDG, 2nd VDG or Lions of Michigan Foundation Trustee) are reminded to send in their intent letters by <u>Monday, January 30, 2012.</u> The letter should come from the club's secretary, signed by the club president indicating the club's support and sent to the persons indicated below. If you have any questions, please contact the Nominations Chair who is listed below.

Nomination Procedures:

Any qualified member of a club in the district seeking the office of District Governor, 1st Vice-District or 2nd Vice-District Governor shall file his/her intention to so run in writing with the (1) Nominating Committee at least sixty (60) days prior to the opening session (March 30, 2012) of the District Convention, with copies to the (2) Cabinet Secretary and (3) Multiple District Executive Secretary and furnish evidence of his/her compliance with the qualifications for said office set out in the International Constitution and By-Laws. The Nominating Committee shall place in nomination at the district convention the name(s) of all candidate(s) so qualified. If none are so received and/or so qualified, then, but then only, nominations for the office may be made from the floor. A candidate shall be allowed one nominating speech of no more than five (5) minutes duration, and one seconding speech of no more than three (3) minutes duration.

Nominations for the office of Trustee of the Foundation shall be written and shall be certified by the President or Secretary of the Nominee's Lions Club as being the act of a majority of the members of the Club, and shall be filed with the District Nominations Committee Chairperson not less than (60) days prior to the convening date of the District Convention (March 30, 2012). The procedure and rules for nominating and electing a trustee of the foundation shall be the same as for District officers, which are indicated in Article 1 of these By-Laws.

LCIF - MELVIN JONES FELLOW AWARD

The following was received from Lions Clubs International Foundation and on the next page is a letter from Immediate Past International President Sid L. Scruggs, III, Chairperson, for Lions Clubs International Foundation regarding some exciting changes in the donation procedures to the Foundation for a Melvin Jones Fellow award: Following the recent Board meeting in Hong Kong, LCIF has an important announcement to share with you regarding the MJF program. As LCIF Coordinators, we hope you will share this important development with the Lions of your district or multiple districts.

Below are details regarding the expansion of the MJF program to include donations to five special program areas? Donors will now be able to receive MJF and PMJF credit when directing their support to:

Disaster

Humanitarian Needs (includes donations to the Measles Initiative)

Sight

Youth

Area of Greatest Need

Restrictions beyond these five special areas will be honored by LCIF, but will not be eligible for MJF or PMJF credit. For example, a donation that is restricted to a specific disaster, such as an earthquake or tornado in a particular region, will not be eligible for credit toward an MJF or PMJF.

The MFJ program was established by LCIF in 1971 to recognize unrestricted donations of US \$1,000. Today, more than 75% of the funding received by the foundation annually is given through the MJF program. By expanding the recognition program, LCIF is able to recognize more individuals while continuing to support its many programs. The expanded program will also offer additional benefits, including:

Donors will now have the opportunity to direct support to a desired special area

LCIF will be able to immediately provide funds for large-scale disaster relief, rather than collecting and distributing funds over a period of weeks or months

Funding directed to "Area of Greatest Need" provides LCIF with the ability to financially support any program within the four general areas. Donors are encouraged to consider this opportunity when making a gift.


Edmore Lions Club



Hunger is no longer a foreign concern. Service group volunteers from the Edmore Lions Club and Christian Endeavor Youth Group recognize that people in the community are struggling to feed their families. These organizations united for their second annual food giveaway on Wednesday, December 7 at 6 p.m. at the Curtiss Building in Edmore. Their financial contributions, as well as a donation from the Maxfield family, will pay for delivery of 10,000 pounds of food acquired through the Feeding America network. Edmore Lions Club and Endeavour youth group also partnered for a 5000-pound food distribution at Christmas time last year.

It was estimated that over 110 families were served with various food items that included dairy, produce and bread products. "We are now able to deliver three times as much food to the local community members than in the past with the Feeding America Mobile Food Pantry."

Then on December 8th, members of the Greenville Lions and Greenville Leo's and spouses went shopping at the local Meijer's store. After hours of shopping and check out, then loading of the truck and making delivery to a local school unloading, back to the store to load the truck and or vans and then back to the school again for unloading.
