

#### **Lions Bear Lake Camp May Newsletter**

Hi Fellow Lions:

It was great to see everyone at the District Conference in Clare and at the District Cabinet Meeting held the same weekend.

Just a quick run through of upcoming events at Bear Lake Camp and fundraisers that help support the ever-popular Kids Summer Camp. Summer sessions are available for children who are blind and visually impaired, deaf and hard of hearing, those with juvenile arthritis and a special camp for siblings of children with cancer.

Camp General Public Open House July12, 2024 Open for tours 2:00 to 5:00 pm

**Visually Impaired and Blind Youth Camp** July 13 – 19, 2025 Provides outdoor activities like climbing the rock tower, kayaking and many other outdoor activities.

**Deaf And Hard of Hearing Camp** July 20 – 26, 2025 Offers an environment with many outdoor adventures and activities plus team-building and leadership development opportunities.

The month of July concludes with Providing a Better Journey (PBJ), which supports foster youth through confidence-building activities and connections.

Just a reminder if you know of a child eligible for "visually impaired or deaf and hard of hearing camp" this summer made affordable by Michigan Lions or any of the other available activities on the website (lions bear lake camp.org) their parents can register directly online, contact their local Lions Club, Bear Lake Camp directly or myself for further assistance or questions. Cost for the visually impaired or deaf and hard of hearing camp week is only \$40 which is often paid by the referring Lions Club.

Clay Shoot—New Event in 2025. Bear Lake is excited to introduce a new clay shoot fundraiser on September 6, 2025, at the Fenton Lake Sportsman's Club. This event will be a fun way to engage supporters while raising funds for the camp. More details will be shared as the event approaches.

**Bear Lake Ultra Marathon** October 4, 2025. Last year they had 114 participants and raised nearly \$10,000. Volunteers and participants are always needed.

Note: Lions of Michigan Bear Lake Open House Weekend, If you can only make one event at Lions Bear Lake Camp this year, "This Is It!!!!" EXCLUSIVE FOR ALL LIONS THROUGH OUT OUR STATE this event will likely be in September 2025, but the date has not yet been confirmed. Camp Executive Director Tracy Tribley has again offered free meals and lodging on Friday Night to be provided for all attendees from our district due to

distance. What an affordable great weekend to experience all this camp has to offer. Indoor Activities, Zip Lining, 50 Foot Rock Wall Climb, Dock Fishing, Archery, Challenge Course experience, camp tours, campfire with smores, comradery with fellow lions and so much more..... I must put in an additional mention of FIVE STAR MEALS prepared by Food Director Chrissy Andre.

Let's try to beat our district attendance last year by promoting this to our clubs. Last year Gov. Tom Mac Naughton and PDG Jim Patterson were able to attend with several of us from our District 11E1.

## AN ADDITIONAL SAMPLING OF RECENT AND UPCOMING EVENTFUL HAPPENINGS AT THE CAMP.

- In April, Lapeer County Search Rescue returned for two additional training weekends.
- Also on April 9th, Lions Bear Lake Camp hosted a day program in partnership with Behavioral Consultants, designed for children with autism. This initiative provided tailored activities to support social engagement, sensory needs, and outdoor exploration in a welcoming environment.
- Cameo Quilting Guild enjoyed a four-day retreat, while the Anchor Bay Quilting Guild, a long-standing partner, also hosted their 10-day session at the camp.
- April also marked the start of the Camp Zip Line Course & Tower Training for staff, with programs continuing into May to certify facilitators, ensure safety protocols are followed, and prepare staff to guide campers through these confidence-building activities.
- In May, Lions Bear Lake Camp will host another autism-focused day program in partnership with Behavioral Consultants. Plans are underway to explore the possibility of overnight camps later in the summer to further expand this partnership.
- Lapeer Rocks returns for another overnight team-building and educational camp for kids from the Lapeer School District.
- At the end of the month, the Camp Cherith Reunion Group will return for their third year. This group of professional women, who grew up as counselors at Camp Cherith, reconnects with camp life and contributes through meaningful volunteer work.

These rentals, training sessions, and partnerships ensure Lions Bear Lake Camp remains a valuable resource for the community year-round while generating essential revenue to support its mission.

Lions Bear Lake Camp's main reason for existence and largest and longest program of the year BEAR LAKE SUMMER KIDS CAMP starts in June. I can't emphasize enough the overwhelming interest from kids who want to attend this camp which speaks highly of the quality of the programs offered and the excellence of the staff which I can personally vouch for. I know I've excitedly reported this previously in the District Newsletter but here it is again for those that may have missed it. Two years ago, Bear Lake Summer Camp hosted 785 kids over 8 weeks. Last year they hosted almost 1100 kids over 8 weeks. This year Summer Camp will be expanded to a projected attendance of "1500" kids over 11 weeks. I believe those numbers speak volumes for themselves.

In conclusion Lions Bear Lake Camp is a State Project, and we need all Michigan Lions and Lion Clubs to support this "AWESOME" camp. There is not any camp like this in the state with all the programs it provides for the kids in Michigan. So, when your Club does its budget for Lions 2026 Year starting this July 2025, please put some money or additional money aside for this SPECIAL CAMP.

#### Louis Braille Award at the District Convention

The Louis Braille Award is one of District 11-E1's prestigious awards given to a Lion from our District at the annual convention who shines in their service to humanity during the past year. It was begun by PDG Wayne Kreitner and his son Michael, from the Greenville Lions Club. What is unique about the award is the last three recipients choose this year's recipient.

The award is a gorgeous plaque as well as a collector's item, the Louis Braille Silver Dollar, minted in 2009. This one-year-only silver dollar coin celebrates the 200th anniversary of Louis Braille's birth in 1809. Sightless since an accident at age 4, Braille developed a system of raised dots so that sight-impaired people could read when he was only 15 years old. This coin is the first U.S. coin with readable braille (dots on reverse spell "braille" in abbreviated form). The reverse side depicts a blind child reading.

The award honors a Lion who, through their efforts, has made outstanding contributions to our district with their hard work and dedication of service, while exhibiting Lion values of Integrity, Accountability, Teamwork and Excellence.

This year's recipient is passionate about service to others, and especially passionate about ways the Lions of Michigan Service Foundation can benefit people in need in our district. Whether it is grants for home fire victims, Kid's Sight opportunities to screen youngsters or collecting used eyeglasses this Lion is a service champion, and very good communicator by letting us all know about service opportunities we should be involved in.

The recipient of the Louis Braille Award is IPDG Jim Patterson from the Fremont Lions Club\_who has gone above and beyond expectations, living out our Lions' mission to serve.

#### **Convention Service Projects**

Lions successfully completed two service projects at the District 11E1 convention April 25-26. On Friday evening many gathered to make toys for pets using old t-shirts, colorful socks, corks and feathers! Strips cut from shirts were braided together into long ropes for dogs. Socks were stuffed, cut and turned into octopuses, some with catnip added! Larger pieces of fabric from shirts were wrapped and tied around empty water bottles to make noisy chew toys. And feathers were poked into holes in corks and glued in for fun cat toys. The toys were divided between seven gift bags, which Lions offered to deliver to animal shelters around our district.

On Saturday, Lions once again came together to fill kids backpacks with items donated by district Lions. Our Clubs and individual members generously brought so many they didn't all fit in the backpacks donated by Mt Pleasant Lions! Luckily Luther Lions sent small bags that held the rest! Some donated items were meant *to help kids with cancer* be more comfortable – soft socks, hats and scarves, lip balm, lotion, and other things were to entertain and provide some fun at camp this summer. We had books, coloring and activity books, crayons, stress toys, friendship bracelets, Beanie Babies, stickers, suckers, etc.

Thank you to all Lions and Clubs that helped us be able to give 30 bags to kids with cancer! At the convention luncheon these bags were presented to Lisa Keck Kujawa founder of Golden Key Camp. The camp is on hold as Lisa looks for a new site, but all the kids on her waiting list are headed to Camp Quality this summer.













#### **Elections**

At the District Convention the Nominations and Elections Committee consisting of Dave Hamelund, Big Rapids Lions Club, PDG Pam Schroeder, Onekama Lions Club and myself, Steve Adsmond, Fremont Lions Club counted ballots for the election of Lions of Michigan Foundation Trustee candidate PDG Jackie Glazier. She won by a landslide.

Unfortunately, there were no candidates for District Governor, 1st Vice District Governor, and 2nd Vice District Governor.

## Summary of the 3rd Quarter Board of Trustees Meeting Lions of Michigan Service Foundation

#### **Raffle Ticket Sales**

As of May 3, total sales state-wide equals about \$111,000.00, which is down from last year at this point.

The ticket seller's drawing was held. Wells Lions Club won the  $1^{st}$  prize (\$1,000), Dennis Emery of Ravenna won the  $2^{nd}$  prize (\$500), Troop 77 BSA of DeWitt won the  $3^{rd}$  prize (\$250) and the Bark River Lions won the  $4^{th}$  prize (\$100). Keep selling those tickets – drawing isn't until May 17.

#### **Club Donations to the Foundation**

As of the end of the third quarter, clubs in the state have donated \$125,287.29.

In 11-E1, 23 clubs have donated a total of \$14,970. This is up from last year when our district donated \$12,171 for the entire year. This year's donations account for nearly 12% of the total club donations. This is great news!

#### **Grants and Assistance**

As of the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, the foundation has awarded \$97,362.09 in grants and assistance state-wide. In addition, every district has received at least one grant for hearing aids and eyeglass assistance.

In 2023-24 clubs in our district received a total of \$20,254 in grants and assistance. So far this fiscal year, the district has received \$6,995 in direct grants and assistance, 10 hearing aid grants, 7 eyeglass grants.

#### **Emergency Assistance Grants Changes**

At this quarterly meeting, the Board of Directors approved the following changes to the wording of the grant categories. These changes become effective July 1, 2025.

#### **Emergency Disaster Relief Grant**

The Grants and Assistance Committee may award an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant, not exceeding \$1,000, to a Lions Club or Lions District for a property loss incident involving a single family. All grants for single-family incidents must be matched with a contribution from the Lions Club or Lions District equaling, at least, 10% of the grant award from the foundation.

The Grants and Assistance Committee may award an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant of \$1,000 per family, up to a maximum of \$5,000, to a Lions District for a property loss incident involving multiple families.

A Lions Club or Lions District may apply for an Emergency Disaster Relief Grant by making an application to the Lions of Michigan Service Foundation. The required application will be based on the number of families affected by the incident.

Within 30 days of receipt of the emergency funds, the applicant Lions Club or District shall make a report detailing how grant funds were expended. Any portion of the grant that is not utilized for the purpose(s) outlined in the application must be returned in a timely manner.

#### Emergency Individual Assistance Grant - Medical Procedures/Equipment

A sponsoring Lions Club or Lions District (with the authorization of a Foundation Trustee) or a Foundation Trustee on behalf of his/her District may apply for emergency assistance for an individual with a diagnosed medical need. Application will be reviewed by the Grants & Assistance Committee and may be approved for up to \$2,000 within budget limitations. Assistance applications will be prioritized based on the current medical and financial need of the a2applicant, and applications for procedures or equipment to correct or improve vision or hearing loss will receive funding priority.

#### Emergency Individual Assistance Program - Military Family and Veteran's Relief

A sponsoring Lions Club or Lions District (with the authorization of a Foundation Trustee) or a Foundation Trustee on behalf of his/her District may apply for emergency assistance for a current military member, military veteran or his/her surviving spouse with an emergency financial need. Applications will be reviewed by the Grants & Assistance Committee and may be approved for up to \$2,000 within budget limitations.

#### **Lion Robert Mathog Hearing Scholarships**

Only three applicants for the four annual \$1,000.00 scholarships: Anna Baker of Lewiston, Rachel Chomas of Okemos, and McKenzie Kallin of Davison

#### **Kidsight Screenings**

At the end of the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter, there have been a total of 30,659 children screened with 3,376 referrals state-wide.

In our district, 10 clubs in 11-E1 have screened 621 children with 46 referrals. Midland Lions accounted for one-third of the total.

Overall, the foundation is in good shape and working towards finishing up another great year.

#### **Club Chronicles**

#### Coleman







Like most clubs in District 11E-1 Coleman Lions Club does an annual White Cane collection of money to be used for local and statewide vision programs. I am always amazed how many people recognize our brand and are willing to donate without question. It is impossible to predict who will donate. I collect at a gas station, some people with fancy high priced vehicles will not put in a dime, while others in cars or trucks held together with duct tape and bailing wire give generously. I am particularly touched by parents who give their children money to put in the collection can, teaching them a valuable lesson in the importance of giving. The contact with, and support of the members of our community is a real shot in the arm. Coleman Lions is a long-time team supporter and sponsor of Coleman Youth Athletic Association summer baseball and softball. We became interested in helping CYAA improve their indoor practice facility more than a year ago when a few Lions visited the pole barn style building for a tour. We were shown the south wall which had a gap along the bottom, originally meant to drain melting ice since it was built to be an ice-skating rink. The openings were covered by astroturf and weren't readily visible, but cold air was still able to get in, not to mention insects and mice! It was decided then to write a grant to LCIF to seal the bottom of the south wall.

When Coleman Lions received word that the grant money was approved, project manager Lion Chuck Dinsmore called a meeting to plan the project, including making a list of materials to purchase. From there everything went very quickly. April 7<sup>th</sup> was construction day. Using 2x12 boards, foam insulation, Liquid Nails and pea stones to help seal the outside wall, the project was done!

Enough scrap materials were left to do patching and sealing on the north wall on a second workday five days later. Over the span of 10 days nine Coleman Lions and two friends put in a total of 84 hours to complete the project!





### **Empire**

At the recent District Convention in Clare, the Empire Lions Club was recognized for their work in researching unmarked graves at the local cemetery and providing markers for over 100 graves. The club was presented with the Kindness Matters Service Award in recognition of their tremendous contribution to their community.
