Zone's Second Meeting Highlights

As the Christmas holiday winds down, I am pleased to share details about our Zone's second meeting. I have the privilege of taking over a strong zone, previously championed by Lion Diane Fleming. Once again, every club in our zone participated, with a total of 27 Lions in attendance.

Focus on Membership Growth

The primary focus of our second meeting was increasing membership. Zone members received valuable information, which was originally presented by PDG Ron Sharp at the Fall 11 E-1 Conference. This presentation covered how to use Artificial Intelligence to analyze community demographics, create membership growth plans, and utilize digital tools for recruiting new members.

Additionally, we explored the Lions Portal for resources on membership growth, which included useful articles such as "Tips to Grow Your Club," the "8-step Plan to Increase Lions Membership," and an example of an Elevator Speech for sharing concise Lion Club information with prospective members. Each club also received a copy of the Lions International "Just Ask" toolkit, which offers a wealth of information and forms to help develop a member recruitment team.

District 11 E1 Convention Details

Information was shared regarding the upcoming District 11 E-1 convention, scheduled to be held at the Evergreen Resort in Cadillac on March 27th and 28th. This centrally located venue offers an excellent guest room rate of \$99 plus 15% taxes, and the meal prices have been discounted to \$20 each, making the event more accessible to all members.

The convention's Service Project will involve constructing 15 beds for the "Sleep in Heavenly Peace" initiative. Clubs are invited to sponsor a bed with a \$250 donation, which covers all costs associated with the project.

New Member Induction

After breaking for dinner, District Governor Schafer inducted three new members into the Shepherd Club: Renee and Thomas Chisplell, sponsored by Richard Hetherington, and Kim Lavigne, sponsored by Robert Gates.

Club Project Updates

Following the induction, each club was invited to share updates on their projects since the last Zone meeting. It was inspiring to hear about the wide range of activities our clubs are undertaking in their communities, the list is truly extensive.

Global Leadership Team (GLT) Corner:

Leadership Matters: Filling Our FVDG Vacancy for a Strong 2026–2027

As we begin a new year focused on service, growth, and planning for the future, it's important that we also address a critical leadership need within our district. As your Global Leadership Team (GLT) Coordinator, I want to bring attention to the importance of filling our **First Vice District Governor (FVDG)** vacancy—and what it means for the stability of our district moving forward.

At this time, our district does **not** have a Lion serving in the FVDG role. This position is essential because the FVDG becomes our **District Governor Elect** and, ultimately, the District Governor. If we are unable to appoint or elect a Lion to fill the FVDG vacancy—or if a Past District Governor is not willing to step forward to accept an appointment to repeat a term—our district will face a serious leadership gap for the **2026–2027** Lions year.

It is also important to note that our current District Governor is **not eligible to serve a second consecutive term**. Without a qualified Lion in place as FVDG, the District Governor position for the 2026–2027 year will remain **vacant**.

What Happens If the DG Position Becomes Vacant?

If we reach the end of the year without a District Governor Elect/Appointed in place, the responsibility for leading and supporting the district will fall to our Past District Governors or the Immediate Past District Governor. These leaders may need to temporarily share duties to keep the district operating smoothly until the 2026–2027 FVDG can be elected at the **2027 district convention** and move into the DG Elect role.

While this structure ensures our district can continue to function, it is not ideal. Lions Clubs International is strongest when leadership roles are fully staffed with prepared and enthusiastic Lions ready to guide our clubs and support our members.

This Is the Time to Step Forward

Our district is filled with capable, dedicated Lions who have the experience, passion, and heart to lead. If you—or someone you know—has ever considered serving as a District Governor, this is the moment to explore the opportunity. The GLT is here to support, mentor, and prepare future leaders every step of the way.

Strong leadership today ensures a strong district tomorrow. Let's work together to fill this vital role and keep our district *Anchored in Service, Lighting the Way Forward*.

Understanding Our Lions Club Nomination & Election Process

Each year, our club selects new leaders to serve in key officer roles — such as President, Secretary, Treasurer, and other important positions. This democratic process helps ensure strong leadership and continuity of service. Here's how it works:

1. Nomination Meeting

In early spring (typically March), the club holds a **Nomination Meeting**. At this meeting:

- A **Nominating Committee**, appointed by the club president, presents a proposed slate of candidates for each office.
- Members may also nominate qualified Lions from the floor at this meeting.
- Notice of the meeting must be given to all members at least **14 days in advance** by mail, email, or personal delivery.

This step ensures every member has a chance to participate in selecting candidates.

2. Election Meeting

Following nominations, the club holds an **Election Meeting** (typically in April):

- All qualified nominees are listed in the official notice provided to members at least **14 days before the election**.
- Only those members present and in good standing at the meeting may vote.
- Elections are conducted by **secret written ballot**.

To be elected, a candidate must receive a **majority of the votes** cast by members present. If no candidate wins a majority on the first ballot, further rounds of voting are held until someone does.

3. Taking Office

Once elected, officers typically begin their term on **July 1st** and serve for one year. The club secretary then reports the new officers to Lions Clubs International (via the Lion Portal) within 15 days after the election.

Why This Matters

This structured process ensures transparency, fairness, and member involvement in choosing the leaders who will guide our club in serving the community. If you are interested in leadership or would like to nominate someone, mark the nomination meeting on your calendar and participate!

Global Service Team (GST) Corner:

2025-2026 Club Excellence Award Criteria

The Club Excellence Award acknowledges the dedication and legacy of service within individual clubs. Excellence Awards honor club leaders who demonstrate outstanding membership growth, impactful service and humanitarian contributions. This year's criteria are:

1. **Induct** a minimum of two (2) or 20% new members, whichever is greater (does not include transfer, reinstated, or charter members). Eligibility is determined based on the Club's membership count on June 30, 2025.
2. **Or sponsor** a new Lions Club.
3. **Report a minimum of four (4) service activities** in the Lions Portal. Three of these service activities must show participation in each of the three International "Weeks of Service."
 - a. **Hunger: January 3-11, 2026**
 - b. Environment: April 18-26, 2026
4. **Report newly elected club officers** in Lion Portal by May 15, 2026 of the current Lion Year.
5. A minimum of 10% of the club's members **complete any three courses** in the Lions Learning Center.
6. **The Club President** for the current Lion year must not have served more than two consecutive terms.
7. **A minimum of two or more club officers** (president, vice president, secretary, or treasurer. Of which, one must be the club President) complete Club Officer Training (on-line with Lions Learning Center or in-person as reported by a GLT coordinator) between May 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025.
8. **Contribute to LCIF** a minimum of the Club's membership total on June 30, 2025 of the previous Lion year, multiplied by \$20.

Lions Service Project for Next District 11-E1 Cabinet Meeting (Saturday February 7)

These are just the tip of the iceberg of possibilities. Anything that might interest you may interest a person living alone, so we don't have to reinvent the wheel.

Anything in excess to what the Isabella Commission on Aging can use will be spread out to any other senior centers in our District. Come be a part of this Service Project.





KidSight Wrap Up

At the beginning of 2026, it's worth looking back at the KidSight Michigan project in our district and all that we accomplished in 2025. We were pretty much at a standstill after the Covid lockdown. This year was a "waking up" for us. We've had more activity this year than before 2020. We're still way down in our numbers but things are looking up!

This year everyone with expired background checks, except two, renewed their status. We now have 34 certified volunteers and 30 certified vision screeners in the district.

We held 25 screening events district-wide. This is way up from last year. The Midland Lions Club led the pack with nine screenings followed by Coleman Lions with four, Fremont Lions with three and eight other clubs with two or one screening each.

Clubs screened a total of 1,318 children and had 98 referrals. That sounds like a lot until you realize there are approximately 111,700 school-aged children in our district. We screened less than 2% of the total kids that needed one. We have lots of room for growth.

The district has four Welsh Allyn "cameras" that I know of. We own two KidSight trailers. With all the certified vision screeners in our district, we can come to your area and do a screening event. All a club needs to do is make the contacts, do the scheduling and provide some volunteer help.

I cannot stress enough how important vision screening is. In my opinion it is one of the most important things we do as Lions! The scanner/camera is such a marvelous, easy-to-use tool and it does so much.

One of the most significant things it does is to check for conditions that may cause "lazy eye" (amblyopia.) Lazy eye is a condition where the brain favors one eye over the other. This cannot be found with an eye-chart style of exam. When not found by age seven, the condition may become permanent. If for no other reason than that, every child should be screened and you can do it.

As many of you know, I have been restricted in my activity since my spine surgery. I am happy to report that I am starting physical therapy in January and will be back to full-time activity soon. My plan is to schedule a few training sessions to help clubs get back on track scheduling screenings.

If your club has never had a vision screening event, it is time to get started. Contact me and I will assist you in contacting your local school districts, early learning centers, and day care businesses. Let's continue the rebuilding of our district's valuable KidSight program and set ourselves a goal of screening 5% of the children in our district.

Giving Day Unites Nonprofits

Big Rapids – A steady stream of visitors moved through the Big Rapids Eagles 2535 as more than 50 Mecosta County nonprofits gathered for Giving Day 2025, an event organizers say brought the largest turnout of participating groups to date.

The annual Giving Day, organized by the Mecosta County Lions and the Rotary Club of Big Rapids, ran from 11am – 6pm Tuesday at the Eagles, 18361 16 Mile Road. The event invited community members to learn about local organizations, make donations and explore volunteer opportunities while giving nonprofits a chance to share resources and connect with one another.

Lions Club member Dave Hamelund said this year's participation reached about 53 nonprofits, including new additions such as AMVETS and the American Legion. "Everything's going great," Hamelund said. "We've got a lot of nonprofits, more than ever, and they're very anxious to meet the public." Hamelund said the goal of Giving Day is to place every nonprofit on equal footing, particularly when it comes to visibility and outreach. He said many organizations excel at marketing while others struggle, and bringing everyone into the same room helps ensure the public has a chance to meet groups they may not otherwise encounter. "The Lions Club and the Rotary Club put this on to level the playing field for all the nonprofits that want to participate," Hamelund said. "It raises the boat for everybody, which is the name of the game."

For some organizations, Giving Day offered an introduction to the size and scale of the county's nonprofit network.

Michelle Kauffold of the Mecosta County Optimists Club said she was surprised by the number of groups represented. "It shows how much need there is out there," Kauffold said. The Optimists participated for the first time and used the event to promote membership opportunities and their hand-drawn note cards, which Kauffold said have been a consistent fundraiser.

For others, the day provided a way to learn about lesser-known services and discover new partners.

Ken Theobald of Leader Dogs for the Blind said he first learned about several Mecosta County organizations by attending Giving Day in past years. "I think it's a great way to bring all the nonprofits in the area together and help people understand what they do," he said. Theobald said the format encourages collaboration since organizations often pick up ideas or make connections they might not find elsewhere. "The rising tide raises all ships," Theobald said. "When you find out what the needs are, you want to help meet them in some way."

Paul Griffith of Mecosta Recycles said he appreciates that the event serves the community while also giving nonprofits time to interact. "It makes it really easy for the community to come to once place and learn," Griffith said. "It also allows all the organizations to connect with each other. There's great energy."

That visibility mattered for nonprofits such as Artworks, which benefits from foot traffic and personal interaction, development coordinator Paul Zube said. Zube said visibility is often a challenge because nonprofits are scattered across the country. "It puts all the nonprofits who are doing incredible stuff in one place," Zube said. He added that the shared space made conversations about overlapping missions and collaboration easier to start.

Hamelund said he hopes the exposure strengthens each organization's ability to serve Mecosta County. "We just need the public to show up and find out what good people are doing to help our neighbors," Hamelund said.
