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Eions Clubs International Foundation (LCIF)

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District and Club Community Impact Grant Program

District and Club Community Impact Grants (DCG) empower Lions to support humanitarian activities in their communities. Funded by contributions from clubs and districts to LCIF, these grants incentivize Lions' donations and service projects that align with the foundation's key areas of focus. Under the program, 15% of qualifying unrestricted donations are set aside for DCGs, with all projects requiring LCIF approval. This initiative is available to both districts and clubs. Only donations to the Empowering Service Fund are eligible for DCG funding.

Districts or clubs qualified for DCG funds can apply at any time. Submit applications to LCIF at least 90 days before the project starts to allow for processing. District applications must be signed by the current district governor and certified by the district cabinet, while club applications require the club president's signature and certification from the club board

I think DG Jeff has already received information about his new Leader Dog puppy when he returns me in September. She is a yellow female Lab named Avi. We think she is coming from a Michigan prison but don't know which one. I hope everyone has a wonderful Independence Day holiday. Woof Woof!

Lions July Issue Bear Lake Camp News Steve Glazier District 11E1 Bear Lake Camp Chairperson

Hi Fellow Lions! Wow, I blinked and here we are in the last six months of 2025 under the guidance of our new Governor Jeff Schafer. Lions Bear Lake Camp is thrilled to report that they have just started another fantastic camp year at the beginning of June. They had a new record 1079 kids experience camp last summer over an eight-week period. This was a substantial increase from 785 attending two summers ago which was a previous record.

This year 2025 Summer Camp will be expanded to a projected "1500 kids over 11 weeks". We should all be proud that all Michigan Lions play a part in the success of this Camp just by being a Lion. To clarify, not all attending 1500 kids though are financially supported by Lions. Only Visually Impaired and Hard of Hearing camps are funded by Lions at a nominal cost of \$40 per camper with Lions picking up the estimated \$800 balance per camper. Often the \$40 is even paid for by the referring Lions Club. Most of the Kids Summer Camp attendees "are not" sponsored by Lions such as Autism, Foster Care, Grievance Loss, Cancer, and many others are typically contracted to other groups and organizations at negotiated rates based on a variety of factors such as the activities and facilities they utilize, which staff they require from Bear Lake and whether their mission aligns with Bear Lake's. Usually, these camps do not require as many Bear Lake Camp staff members as they often bring their own counselors, chaperones, nurses and coordinators. So, you can see that if there is a special needs kid, there probably is a Lions Kids Camp for them. If you know of a child eligible for visually impaired or deaf and hard of hearing camps made affordable by Lions or any of the other kids camp available on the web site, their parents can register directly online on LIONS BEAR LAKE CAMP website, contact your local Lions Club, the Bear Lake Camp directly or myself for further assistance.

A quick overview of Lions Bear Lake Camp for any newer members just starting to read our Lions District 11E1 Newsletter. Lions Bear Lake Camp is owned by "all" Lions in the State of Michigan. It's located on 120 acres in Lapeer Michigan (about 20 miles west of Flint). At full capacity, it can house 160 occupants. The Camp consists of 10 two story "modern dorm style" cabins housing 16 people each and a main lodge, all located on the camp's own private lake. There are additionally several other buildings for various uses. But by not describing them or their uses you now have an additional reason to come visit the camp.

The Summer Camp is open to ages 6 to 16 years old. Camp activities include a variety of things such as trail hikes, wheelchair accessible paved trails, rope climbing, 50 foot climbing tower, zip line, team building games and challenges, group bonding, bonfires, swimming, camp fire smores, songs, crafts, fishing, boating and so much more! It was initiated by Big Al Kassin in 1982. The Camp was opened at its current location in 2000 with the following Bear Lake Summer Camps being "sponsored" by Lions. Visually Impaired Youth that started it all has been available for 38 years. Later in history, adding Lion Summer Camps for Deaf and Hard of Hearing kids, also a special Hard of Hearing and Visually Impaired weekend camp added that includes their family attending. Diabetes Camp for kids while previously supported is now sustained by another juvenile diabetes camp about 20 minutes from Bear Lake camp. 85% of the Bear Lake summer staff are returning campers.

A reminder about Lions Bear Lake Camp Lions of Michigan weekend coming up this fall. I know I said this in last month's issue but......If you can only make one event this year to Lions Bear Lake Camp "THEN THIS IS THE ONE"!. I am excited to report that a fun time can be had by all at this year's annual Lions Bear Lake Camp open house Friday September 26th and Saturday September 27th. This weekend experiences is exclusive to "all" Lions in Michigan from Past and Present International Directors and Governors to New Club Members. Your weekend will start with a Friday leisure no stress drive to Bear Lake Camp in Lapeer Michigan through some beautiful countryside and small towns. Upon arrival you will be greeted by Tracy Tribley, Executive Camp Director, and Chrissy Andre, our State Chairperson and Food Director. You will then be assigned a "free night's stay" dormitory style, spacious cabin (10 in total each housing up to 16 people) including indoor bathroom and showers, overlooking a beautiful tranquil lake. After a "free" fabulous buffet dinner provided by Bear Lake Camp (They will also provide a "free" fabulous breakfast and lunch on Saturday and no worries about any special dietary needs as they've got that covered after working with a Camp projected record of almost 1500 kids this summer).

Did you pick up on how affordable this weekend getaway will be, all while learning what Bear Camp has to offer? It's not only for kids summer camp but activities throughout the year for adults too.

Friday evening will conclude with a bonfire, smores, conversation, laughter and comradery. The following morning activity choices at Bear Lake Camp include conquering a 50 foot rock climbing tower and zip lining experience, complete of course with instructions, safety harness and supporting safety overhead rope lines. All pre-tested by several Certified Camp course instructors before allowing us to face our inner most fears but then feeling exhilarated at having completed something that secretly was on your bucket list. I know I can't wait to do it again....Sign me up!!!!

They can even accommodate adults and kids with mobility issues on the tower climb and zip line as proven by one of the attending Lions, Sue Adams, last year, with their accessible facilities. She was able to climb the tower, use the zip line and be lowered back into her mobility device. To paraphrase Chrissy Andre, Camp State Director, "That moment captured the spirit of inclusion that Bear Lake Camp stands for." Other more leisurely activity choices will include fishing off a dock in front of the cabins (poles and bait provided), archery (equipment or small game license not required :), camp tours, nature center tour, boating and I believe I saw a sign up for an indoor activity.

Another of my favorite activities last year was to try a few of the 16 Team Building and Problem-Solving Challenge stations placed throughout the woods such as tight rope walking. This consists of walking a low to the ground (maybe a foot) approximately 20-foot stretched cable while holding on to overhead ropes spaced about 5 or 6 feet apart, but not to worry your teammates are on both sides of you to support you. Then mix it up having the next person doing it backwards and for the final event last year having me walk it backwards, blind folded, with one rope removed without telling me!!! All the while being guided and supported by your fellow team members to keep you from falling.

Another event last year was the group balance platform (Aptly called "the boat") where the platform could tilt 360 degrees from a central pivot point. The objective was to work together as a group to try to balance the platform level with everyone standing on it. You soon learned moving one person's foot a few inches can change the center of gravity. It's a lot harder than it sounds, but certainly fun was had by all! The Challenge Course Coordinator/Director, Kenny Gillotte, is a former student camper himself who went on to college and received his master's degree and who returned to give back to the Camp. Kenny also teaches and explains to the group and the individuals in a very dynamic way how all these challenges that need to be overcome and what are perceived to be mental obstacles in each of the 16 challenges can actually help you navigate through real life.

So, if you're looking for something affordable to excite your senses and challenge your inner self or just enjoy kicking back and relaxing on your cabin deck overlooking the lake absorbing all nature has to offer or even just hanging out at the main hall making new Lion friends, then Lions Bear Lake Camp Open House for all Lions throughout the State is the place to be this September 26th and 27th Of special note this may be an especially great additional recruitment enticement tool for younger members showing an interest in joining your club.
