

Everyone dreads tax season. It gets to be a complex process for some. You always wonder if you will be getting a refund or paying extra taxes.

We have good news concerning our Michigan Income Taxes and our Lions of Michigan Service Foundation.

It has been a long and difficult job but our Lions Foundation was able to get the legislature to approve the opportunity for the Service Foundation to be placed on the Michigan Income tax form as a recognized tax contributing organization. There are approximately four other state related groups on the form that MI residents can contribute to. Governor Snyder signed the legislation in June. This means that any MI resident filing an income tax form can check the Michigan Lions Service Foundation as a recipient of a portion or all their tax refund. If a resident is not receiving a refund, they can still indicate that they would like to give some money to the Foundation through their tax form.

In order to continue this process and keep the MI Lions Service Foundation on the tax form , the Foundation must continue to earn \$50,000 a year in contributions from other sources. **We need to**

get the word out and encourage our Lions and other residents of Michigan to consider the Foundation when doing their taxes.

KidSight Update - KidSight Team Leader, Sandy House

On October 3rd and 4th, we screened 69 children with 8 referrals at Longview Early Childhood Center – Midland. On Saturday, October 6th, we screened 51 children with 4 referrals at the Home Depot Kids Day - Midland On October 11, we screened 41 children with 5 referrals at West Midland Family Center.

On Saturday, October 13, we screened 22 children with 2 referrals at the Mt. Pleasant Sam's Club.

On October 17, we screened 20 children with 2 referrals at the Memorial Presbyterian Preschool - Midland

On October 22, we screened 87 children with 7 referrals at Vestaburg Elementary School.

On October 23, we screened 33 children with 2 who didn't pass but they are already under a Doctor's care. That screening took place at the Greenville HS Expo.

We had a heartwarming event at the Home Depot KidSight Screening. We met two families who each had a child who now had glasses due to a previous KidSight screening. They both said that they had no idea that their child had vision problems before they had our Lions screening.




The State DEFENSE AGAINST DIABETES (DAD) grant application is moving along district and statewide. Statewide Michigan's 11 districts are competing for a \$250,000 to reduce/prevent diabetes and to teach residents to manage diabetes more effectively.

VISION: "Reduce the prevalence of diabetes and improve the quality of life for those diagnosed"

Goals:

- · Educate Lions and their communities about diabetes and prediabetes.
- · Develop community environments that inspire and support healthy lifestyles.
- · Increase access to diabetes care, medication and diagnostic equipment.
- Increase coordination and support in the implementation of national diabetes policies and plans.

The Lions grant that we are working to receive is a matching grant. If we receive it each Lions District (11) is responsible for a portion of the match. District 11 E1 had a similar grant that was administered by PDG Ron Gibson and Lion Bill Bradfield. The District 11 E1 grant was not a matching grant. However, it was so successful that the Council of Governors has applied for a grant to cover the entire state to fight diabetes.



Project KidSight

Our District KidSight screeners have been busy this fall with preschool screenings in Midland, Montcalm and Newaygo counties. There have also been screenings at the Mt. Pleasant and Traverse City Sam's Clubs, Midland Home Depot, Halloween parties in Crystal and Mt. Pleasant, and the Greenville High School Expo. Where could your club hold a screening? Think outside the box. Is there a local event where families will be gathering? Find a place or event, call me or one of our KidSight screeners to find out if a camera is available. Did I mention we have new partnerships with Home Depot and Kohls? Check with your local store and ask about their Kid's Days.

FREMONT LIONS

On Monday, October 15, 2018. Lion Steve Adsmond welcomed Sarah Hinkley, Professor and Chief of Vision Rehabilitation Services, from Ferris State University to the October 15, Fremont Lions membership meeting. The Fremont Lions and Ferris have a special connection through the Students In Need of Eye care (SINE) project that Sarah has organized over the past few years. The purpose of SINE is to provide eye examinations and glasses to area children. In 2015 and 2017, over 100 students from the Fremont and Hesperia school systems have participated in this program thanks to generous grants obtained through the Gerber and Fremont Area Foundations. The Fremont Lions club is working on organizing a repeat of this program for 2019. Sarah explained that this program is designed for rural school systems to provide comprehensive eye examinations instead of simple eye screening normally given. There are several reasons that students often do not have adequate eye examinations including the lack of providers accepting state-run insurance, poor access to care and sometimes lack of parental motivation.

The Fremont Lions coordinate with the school systems for bus transportation for approximately 30 students per school and supervise the students during the trip and the eye exams. The students are identified by a program coordinator from each school. The eye exams are performed by third semester MCO students who are supervised by Ferris faculty members. 60% of the students examined are found to be in need of glasses, which are also provided at no cost to the student through this program. 37% of the students are found to have an eye disorder, requiring some form of follow-up care.
