2ND VDG AL ROESELER'S MESSAGE

One example of insanity is a person who repeats a behavior and expects a different result. Since most of us consider ourselves to be rational humans we know that if we do again what we just did, we will get again what we just got. I know this seems to be a bit of a leap, but bear with me; as I apply the thought to membership.

As we all know, most Lions clubs in our district (not to mention the entire country) struggle with membership. The problem is two pronged; attracting new members and retaining current members. If we are to address the problem in a rational manner, we must conclude that what we are currently doing is not working. If we are to change this trend, we must change the way we go about recruitment, and retention.

Retention is an issue that needs to be at the forefront of how we treat other Lions. People rarely leave an organization where they feel included and valued. Every Lions club loses members. We cannot do anything about Lions who move or die, but if we view all our fellow Lions as the valuable resource that they are, fewer would choose to leave voluntarily. If your club is cliquish, and not welcoming of new ideas (particularly from newer members) you need to do some sole searching as a club, and make some changes. Lions club meetings should be happy places where members enjoy themselves and feel valued on meeting nights.

Besides death and taxes there is one other sure thing. A person will not join a Lions club if they are not asked! For most Lions asking acquaintances, or friends to join is a difficult thing, but there are other things you can do. Recently I talked with IPDG Ron about membership. He came up with 8 quick ideas for recruitment; host an information night, approach the Chamber of Commerce, use realtors, canvas local institutions, ask relatives, invite people to help at club projects, ask businesses to sponsor an employee, and recruit outside your community. In addition the LCI website has fantastic resources for recruiting new members that are well worth consideration. Make a presentation on the site at a club meeting.

If we continue to approach the issue of membership as we have in the past we will continue to lose membership. Any sane person must recognize that as a fact. If we continue to lose membership we will eventually cease to exist. So we must change or die! For most humans change is difficult, but it can be done. Try some new approaches, what have you got to lose?
