Publicizing a project or club event must be done in a timely manner. And that, my fellow Lions, is a very difficult task for me. Like this message - it's already been three days and this is as far as I've gotten.

We all know that recruiting new members makes it vital that we inform them of the benefits of service to others. Not just the help given to those in need but the benefits received by the giver, both mentally and spiritually. In short, we need to give them a reason to want to join.

We need to "brag" more. We need to tell our story better - more thoroughly. Dare I use the word Publicity? If we are to reach potential members, we must learn to use social media to publicize the good things we're doing. The thing about Facebook is that it is designed for "off the cuff" remarks - something I'm just not good at. Actually I suspect that is true for a lot of us. Not only are we not comfortable using the media, we have trouble composing the message. Here's my method.

OK, actually it's more like "stealing" the message. The secret is to start early. Want to publicize a pancake supper? Fire up your favorite search engine and search for "pancake supper." You will be amazed at what pops up. Read a few of them to see how they do it. Go on, steal any good idea you find. Next search for suitable images or take your own photos. A good place to find royalty free downloadable images is pixabay.com. So now you have an idea and pictures. Open up your favorite word processor and compose your message. I ABSOLUTELY NEVER compose in FaceBook. That's just me asking for trouble. If the event calls for it I will create two or three messages. Once I have my messages how I want it, I save everything and then wait until the right time to post it.

Sounds simple, doesn't it? It is simple. It's just not easy. Good publicity takes work. But it is work that will pay dividends! A good publicity plan will accomplish its task: making the public know what's going on in your club. It will bring customers to your fund raisers, volunteers to your service projects and maybe even a few new members. What a concept!

Global Membership District 11E1 Report

After the first quarter of our Lions year (September 30th), I am pleased to report that our district membership has increased by 13. Ten clubs in the district have lost a total of 24 members, but ten clubs have added a total of 37 members. I believe this is a great start to the year.

Since becoming Global Membership Chair last year, I have suggested that clubs consider hosting an open house for their communities. This provides Lions an opportunity to communicate to a wider audience their mission, accomplishments, and the resources they can provide. Earlier this month my home club Coleman hosted such an event. We invited quite a few people to our open house. Unfortunately, I believe our follow-up was not what it should have been. We did not call invitees as the event neared to remind them of the opportunity. As a result, we had only three people attend. None the less I believe we put on a compelling program about the value of Lions and the many opportunities to serve. Two of the three attendees have agreed to join our club. We were quite pleased with the result.

As part of LCI's efforts to increase membership to 1.5 million by 2027, membership development grants are available on a competitive basis. Our district can apply for a \$1,500 grant that must include chartering at least one new club of 20 members and adding 30 new members to existing clubs. I believe a broad range of ideas needs to be considered to develop a strong application. If anyone is interested in working on a grant proposal, please let me know.

Again, this year I am available for presentations on strategies and to assist clubs in their growth efforts. My contact information is in the district directory. Please let me know if there is any way I can be of assistance.

News from your District Service Coordinator

The MD11 GSTs, with approval from the District Governors, are currently planning 3 service projects this year. Child size blankets will be tied at the Forum to go with the bunk beds being built for children by <u>Sleep in Heavenly Peace</u>. A hundred and ten fleece blanket kits are being ordered from Jo Ann Fabrics for this project. The second project is to provide money to the <u>Hope to Walk</u> project for prosthetic legs (@\$250 each) for children, women, and men in 3rd world countries. The third project is working with the <u>Kid's Coalition Against Hunger</u> at the MD11 convention to assemble bags of food (soup or casserole).

There is money in the State Budget for service and it was voted to use \$5,000 of it to subsidize these projects. Each District is being asked to contribute at least \$264, to be collected by the District treasurer Peggy Frank, and sent to Wendy Burns Director of Lions of Michigan. *Each club in our District is asked to donate \$25 to help meet these goals. Individual Lions who are inspired by one or more of these projects may also donate. Checks should be sent to treasurer Peggy Frank made out to "Lions District 11-E1" with "State Service Projects" on the memo line.*

My hope is that each club will discuss this and vote to send at least \$25 to our district treasurer to support these important projects. Look for an email with links to these projects. (coming in November) Please consider attending the Forum in February and/or the MD11 Convention in May. Both offer great learning experiences as well as camaraderie among our fellow Lions in this District and around the state. You also have an opportunity to meet future or past International Directors and Presidents. It's an amazing experience.

It is also time to file the IRS Federal 990 for our clubs. If your club has less than \$50,000 in annual gross receipts, you can file an e-postcard (also known as a 990-N). If your club has more than \$50,000 in annual gross receipts, the club needs to file the IRS Form 990 or 990-EZ. The e-postcard 990-N is due by November 15 due to the Lions fiscal year. 


Congratulations IPDG Jackie for serving as DG!

Jackie also recognized Midland Lion Scott Berry who was a DG when she was DG the first time.













EMPIRE LIONS

Dead And Forgotten - But Not Forever!

Arthur DeWitt of Empire Township was only 16 when his life was abruptly ended by a kick to the head by a horse in 1892. Richard Tobin, a descendant



of early Glen Lake settlers, died in 1899 at the age of 15 due to a bout of meningitis. In 1901 Lillie Lucks, age 41, passed away giving birth. George Tweddle, a one-room school of the same name exists south of Empire, succumbed to pneumonia at 8 months of age in 1897. How are these tragedies related? They all were buried in unmarked graves at Maple Grove Cemetery 2 miles north of Empire at the junction of M-



109 and M-22. Over a million people drive by them each summer, unaware, on their way to Sleeping Bear Sand Dunes.

A few unmarked graves would not be surprising, but cemetery administrator Claude Fields and volunteer Sandy Wilson discovered, by perusing old, but meticulously kept, cemetery records (thanks to Dorothy Fradd and her predecessors), that there are more than 200 unmarked graves at the Township cemetery with stories of misfortunes like those mentioned above. Over 50 of them are babies or young children, lending credence to the difficulties of life more than one hundred years ago in the middle of "God's Country".

This past Spring, around the dining room table of long-time Empire Township Supervisor Bill Bolton, where several members of the Empire Lions Club had gathered to celebrate a successful Maple Syrup season which will supply their pancake breakfasts, Lion Claude relayed this finding. The opportunity to seek a way to rectify this deficiency energized our group of Lions and the "Commemorative Crew" was born.

What is special about this project is that it involves a cooperative effort between a civic organization (Empire Lions) and a governmental unit (Empire Township). It is an arduous task to locate these unmarked graves in the midst of over 1,500 existing headstones. They are then flagged and the crew of a dozen or so Lions (which includes 98-year-old Jim Dorsey - grandson of one of the earliest settlers of this area) place a small amount of gravel in a hole at the head of the grave, lay a patio stone as a base and then a custom-made marker, with name, date of birth and death, is affixed to base with epoxy cement.

The group has marked 62 graves this Fall, with another 15 slated to be done next week. "This is a marathon, not a sprint", says Lion President Mike Bolton, "but the speed and determination of this crew has turned the marathon into a 5K race!"

The township has committed to paying for the first 100 markers, and a grant is being proposed to the local group of Native Americans which generously donate 2% of their casino profits to local causes and charities. The Lions are also accepting donations from anyone interested in this project with a check being made to Empire Lions, earmarked Commemorative Cemetery Project.

Rest in Peace Arthur DeWitt, you are no longer forgotten!



Youth Camp and Exchange Program

Is the YCE Program Right for Me?

Are you ready to embark on a life-changing adventure that will open your mind and heart? Are you curious about other cultures and ways of life? Do you want to develop your skills in a second language? Would you like to cultivate new friendships with individuals that have different backgrounds, beliefs, and customs than you? The Youth Camps and Exchange (YCE) Program may be the opportunity you are seeking.

Benefits of Participation

As an YCE you will:

- Live with a family in another country
- Meet people your age from around the world
- Learn about what it means to be a Lion or Leo in another country
- Deepen your understanding of yourself and the world around you
- Learn how to foster peace and understanding among peoples of the world

What to Expect

As a Youth Camp and Exchange you can expect to be immersed in a unique cultural experience with Lions and Leo club members supporting your YCE journey. Your host family will treat you as a member of the family, awaiting your engagement in typical daily routines and family meals. You will participate in social activities, possibly service projects and visit cultural places of interest. You are expected to familiarize yourself with the customs, expectations and basic language of the host country prior to your visit and have a desire to learn more. You can learn more about the roles and expectations of a Youth Exchange by checking out the Youth Camp and Exchange Handbook!

Participant Eligibility

The suggested age range for Youth Camp and Exchange is 15-22. Please note age range can vary by specific Youth Camp and Exchange program. Youth Camp and Exchange must:

- Be sponsored by a Lions club
- Be ready to represent your community, country and the sponsoring Lions club
- Welcome the opportunity to explore the customs of another culture
- Provide proof of insurance (health, medical, travel) and a liability release agreement
- Take initiative to learn the language of the host country (i.e. basic greetings and phrases)

What are the Costs?

Local program costs vary from country to country. Financial arrangements for transportation may be paid by the Sponsor Lions Club, by the Exchange Youth, the Exchange Youth's family or a combination of these sources. Host Lions clubs cover the costs of room and board with a host family. Exchange Youth are typically responsible for: Round-trip airfare, Camp Fees, Health, medical and travel insurance, Travel documents (such as passports and visas), and Spending money.



Youth Camps & Exchange Program Outgoing Young Adult Ambassadors

Selection of a Lions Young Adult Ambassador

The appropriate selection of a young adult to represent a Lions Club, community, state, and America is of paramount importance. The choice should be a young adult who, it is believed, will make a good "ambassador" both in words and actions. Both areas of character are a reflection of the USA and are of equal importance. Academics are a factor in the selection process, but other areas

of a person's character also demonstrate qualities of strength that make a good ambassador. These could be sports, music, leadership, technology, and the like. A young person with good character is what the Lions seek. A request to travel has never been denied if a young adult has interest. Young adult ambassadors that <a href="https://hatch.com/hatch.co

Lions believe that every opportunity should be extended to a young adult to expand his/her knowledge, international understanding, and education in cultural diversity. People of the world need to appreciate and understand one another. This can be done through exposure to the culture, through an immersion in the life of a family. As the world becomes smaller through technology, it is imperative that young adults have the opportunity to experience international cultural diversity in order to nurture an improved relationship with America's international neighbors. We do this with the International Lions Youth Exchange Program!

Time Line

September/October/November: District Chairs and committee members promote the program, focusing on and making personal contact with LEO Clubs and/or high schools in their District. Upon a young adult's commitment, the District Chairperson, Lori Shelby, sends the initial application to the State Chairperson, Lion Elvie Marfil. A formal recognition of the young adult's acceptance into the Lions Club Youth Exchange Program will be sent from the state chairperson to both the District Chairperson and the young adult.

December 13 or before: The signed Application, Indemnity Form, and Compulsory Items must be received by the District Chairperson Lion Lori Shelby, Iorishelby@yahoo.com. Some exceptions may apply with permission however; it must go through the District Chair to the State Chair. Signatures are needed at each level. **Upon Commitment, until March 30, the LYE (Lions Youth Exchange) young adult's responsibilities include:**

- Contact clubs via a phone call, letter or email correspondence to obtain donations for travel expenses. Make arrangements to meet with the club personally. A list of clubs and pertinent information is furnished by the District Chairperson. Many clubs will not donate unless there is face-to-face contact. The clubs want to know why this experience is important to the LYE young adult.
- Contact family and friends to solicit funds for travel expenses.
- Create, schedule, and execute fundraisers to raise money for the LYE experience.
- Attend the Fall District/Regional Lions Conference (usually in October) to make the LYE visible to the clubs. The clubs want to know why this experience is important to the LYE young adult.
- Obtain a passport and/or visa.

March 30: All funds should be gathered for travel expenses and submitted to District Chairperson Lion Lori Shelby. February 21 is the deadline for all trip donations from the clubs.

March/April/May/June: Host families are found and flight tickets are purchased. Contact between the host country and the state LYE chairperson is not always immediate. Flight tickets cannot be purchased until a host family is found. Please stick closely to this timeline.

May: Youth and family must attend a mandatory meeting in Lansing for LYE parents/guardians, district LYE chairperson, and/or committee member. The LYE young adult will receive a backpack, shirts, pins, banners, flight tickets, insurance information, and general information about airports, security, filling out immigration forms, etc.

IMPORTANT: Any young adult not making the timeline as listed above (pg. 12) will be dropped from that year's program, unless cleared by the District Chair and State Chair. This is a very time-consuming process for all involved, and it requires all involved to closely follow the deadlines.

Suggestions for LYE Fundraising

Create a display board, short 5-10 minute video, PowerPoint, or oral presentation about yourself and your desire to travel abroad. This can also be used when visiting a foreign country's Lions Club during your stay overseas. Include these points and others as you see fit for your presentation:

- Name and family members
- Where you live
- Your involvement in sports, clubs, music, activities
- Other involvement, whether academic or community-based
- Places you have visited in the past
- Why do you want to visit another country? What will you take from the experience? As an Ambassador for the American Lions Clubs and America, how will you relate to the people of a foreign country? Will you be open to new experiences? Will you taste new foods? Will you practice your foreign language skills?
- 1. Contact clubs via a phone call, letter, or email correspondence to obtain donations for travel expenses. A copy of the PowerPoint or video could be sent to the clubs in lieu of a formal visit when letting the club know of the intent to travel with LYEP.
- 2. VERY IMPORTANT: Make arrangements to meet with the club personally. A list of clubs and pertinent information is furnished by the District Chairperson. Many clubs will not donate unless there is face-to-face contact. The clubs want to know why this experience is important to the LYE young adult. Present your short program to the clubs. They understand that you may be nervous. If timing or distance from a meeting is a problem, send your PowerPoint or a DVD of your video for them to present at a meeting. Follow up with a phone call to be certain that it was received; ask if there are any questions. Write a thank-you note for viewing your presentation at their meeting shortly after the meeting date. Do not wait for any funds to arrive; the clubs look for effort and gratitude.
- 3. Contact friends and family members. Email and/or Facebook are a good way to get the word out to distant family members. Send your PowerPoint or Video presentation. This demonstrates that you have exerted some effort in exchange for their monetary donation. It demonstrates responsibility and adult behavior.
- 4. Contact your church (if applicable) and ask to have a bake sale or car wash after Sunday Service.
- 5. Conduct a community car wash or bake sale. This could occur at a community function, library, or outside a local business.
- 6. Run, walk, or bike ride in an event. Gather pledges before the event occurs.
