

ARCADIA LIONS

Arcadia Lions had a ROARing Good Summer! Over the course of the Summer, the Arcadia Lions planned, hosted, or supported five community events, in addition to our three fundraising pancake breakfasts we hosted for the village.

We work year-round on planning our village's three-day festival, Arcadia Daze, which is held the third weekend of July annually and attended by several thousand people. We have 52 club members, so we couldn't do this without the support of our fellow Arcadians, and this year over 175 volunteered!



This year's 42nd Arcadia Daze Festival highlighted the historical achievements of one of Arcadia's own, Harriet Quimby, Pioneering Woman of Flight. Harriet Quimby was born in Arcadia in 1875 and was the first American woman to earn a pilot's license and the first woman to fly solo over the English Channel. This year's festival focused on her accomplishments and our 2023 Daze T-shirt featured her in an original design created by Annaliese Schwartz, the daughter of one of our members. We had a presentation and book signing by journalist and writer Don Dahler, author of *Fearless: Harriet Quimby A Life Without Limit*.

Arcadia Daze appeals to all, from athletes to auto enthusiasts to kids of all ages; there's something for everyone. The festival kicks off with a Pickleball Tournament on Friday, includes a 5K Run on Saturday morning, and a Doubles Cornhole Tournament on Saturday afternoon. Classic cars and hot rods were showcased at the Auto Muster on Saturday morning. With more than 60 crafts booths to visit there were plenty of handmade goodies from local artisans to purchase. Over 150 kids enjoyed our kids' activities, including Horse Drawn Carriage rides, a Fishing Tournament on Saturday morning, and kids' games and activities in the park, including races, relays, airplane crafts and contests, a bounce house, and Twister Joe, a Balloon Artist. A highlight of the Daze is the outstanding Friday night Fireworks show sponsored by Arcadia Marine, Ketch 22 Kafe and the Stoops family. There was a band at the Finch Park Pavilion for dancing on Friday and Saturday night, and of course, it wouldn't be a Michigan festival without a performance by the Scottville Clown Band, which closed out Arcadia Daze on Sunday following the parade.

This year's parade honored Lion Wes Hull, our town fire chief, as Grand Marshal and showcased an airplane float designed and created by Lion Ryan McKenna, featuring a member of the Michigan 99s, an international organization for female pilots, who portrayed Harriet Quimby.

Arcadia Daze is our major fundraiser of the year, which allows us to donate to youth scholarships,

school and youth groups, and local nonprofits. This year we will contribute \$55,000 to local groups thanks to the generous support of our corporate sponsors and attendees.

The Sky's the Limit



In August, we partnered with Trinity Methodist Church, the Pleasant Valley Community Center and Michigan DHHS Farmworker Outreach Services Division to host a Farmworker Appreciation Dinner for local migrant workers. Thanks to the tireless assistance of Mara Luevano, one of the Migrant Program Staffers, we were able to host over 100 workers. They enjoyed bingo, a bounce house, horse-drawn carriage rides, door prize

drawings, a dinner buffet, and ice cream donated by Camp Arcadia. Thanks to generous donations by members of the community, they could also go through a donation room to pick out blankets, coats, backpacks, shoes, socks, hats, household goods, toys, books and games. This was our first year hosting this program, which was the brainchild of Lion Rick Jones, and plans are already

underway to make next year's event even better. In September, we assisted the Pleasant Valley Community Center with hosting a benefit breakfast which raised funds to support one of our own, Lion Bernie Howard, who suffered a cardiac event while running in the Arcadia Daze 5K. When Bernie collapsed at the finish line there were three physicians, Dr. Laura Heinrich, Dr. Charles Crotteau, and Dr. Geoffrey Prysak who had just run the race and performed CPR to save his life. Since Bernie is unable to work for up to six months while he rehabs, the community center held a pancake breakfast and silent auction benefit for him, which the Lions helped to plan, set up, and staff. The benefit



raised over \$9,000 for Bernie and his family. One of the physicians who did the compressions on Bernie, Dr. Charles Crotteau, stopped by to meet him and his family, and was warmly welcomed by all. Bernie strongly encourages everyone to learn CPR, and part of our community donations this year will support local CPR training for Arcadians.

We ended our summer volunteering at the Music Moves Me Foundation's 2023 Minnehaha Brewhaha, which supports and promotes music education through collaboration with schools and community groups across northwestern Michigan. This annual Labor Day Music and Beer Festival is supported by many members of our club who volunteer as tasting servers, ticket takers or in merchandise sales.



We publicize our events on both our own Facebook page and the Arcadia News Facebook page and residents have come to recognize and appreciate the impact that our club has on our village. As a result, over the

Fall brought our final event, the Village Trunk or Treat event, co-sponsored by the Lions, Arcadia Fire Department, and the Pleasant Valley Community Center. This event featured 20 decorated trunks and our members served hot dogs and joined the villagers in doling out treats to about 75 children.



past two years we have recruited 19 new members, including women, couples and even a teen member. As one new member said, "When I moved here and wanted to get involved, I quickly realized that nothing in this village happens without the involvement and support of the Lions. FREMONT LIONS

SINE (Students In Need of Eyecare) The purpose of SINE is to offer access to quality eyecare and glasses to local students within Newaygo County. The Fremont Lions have organized this program in 2015, 2017, 2019, and 2021. This year's program, organized by chairperson Roger Bradshaw, was in conjunction with the White Cloud Lions Club, and now includes public schools in the White Cloud, Newaygo, Hesperia, and Fremont school districts. Students are chosen by their teachers, counselors or school staff when they can see they are challenged with following along in class. 55 students from these districts were brought to Ferris State University and the Michigan College of Optometry for complete medical eye exams by the FSU MCO junior and senior optometry students, who don't normally get to have pediatric eye exam experience. The lab on the top floor of the Michigan College of Optometry is designed specifically for an event like this one because it's in the shape of a wheel with individual exam rooms being pieces of a giant pie where they can conduct half the exams in the morning for half of the students and the remaining half is examined in the afternoon. If the exam shows the student needs eyeglasses then they proceed to the frame room on the first floor where they choose the frames, and those glasses are made right at Ferris State University for each of the

students needing glasses. This year 55 students were examined and 39 received eyeglasses. Twenty of the students needed additional medical follow-up care, so the generous grant from the Fremont area community foundation that was not used for eye exams and glasses will be used for this follow-up care. Some of the follow-up care can be provided by local optometrists while the rest will need to be done at the Michigan College of Optometry at Ferris State University. This program has many partners, including the four school districts and the City of Fremont, which serves as the financial partner because the city has a 501(c)3 designation and they receive the grant funding and dispense it as the program pays its services.

Mike Kurdy's walk from Mackinaw City to Traverse City was a first time very successful event. This was a fundraiser being done by Mike Kurdy. He is the father of A.J who is one of the Campers and Counselors at Bear Lake Camp. He walked from Mackinaw City to Traverse City a distance of over 100 miles. 100% of the mile pledges and donations went directly to the Camp. Mike covered all expenses involved for this self-promoted event.

The Ultra Marathon was October 6th and was well attended with more participants and growing every year. It's a race for beginners and Ultra veterans alike.
