1ST VDG Jim Patterson's Message



We are coming up on the time when you may be asked to step up to a leadership position. You probably are thinking, "No way! I'm not the leadership type."

Henry Ford once said "Whether you think you can or you can't, you're right." In short, your attitude rather than your skill level has everything to do with your success. Your club and your district need what you have to offer. By avoiding even a small leadership role you deny your club access to your imagination, creativity, uniqueness and passion for serving. It is a loss that shouldn't happen.

I speak from experience. I make no secret of my initial reluctance to serve in district leadership. But others whom I respected gave me the

courage to step up. I admit that I was nervous and concerned that I would do a poor job. But the words of Abraham Lincoln echoed, "I'm a success today because I had a friend who believed in me and I didn't have the heart to let him down." It's true! I am soon to be the district governor because good friends said I should and I couldn't disappoint them. It's been a year and a half now and I'm finding my feet. With the help of good people with great ideas and motivation I am "becoming." You can too.

Your club and your district call on you to serve because they see a quality in you that perhaps you are unaware exists. Besides, you have ideas about how the club or district should be run - you know you do! A leadership role gives you the opportunity to put those ideas to the test. Sure, it's unfamiliar territory but despite those fears it is good territory to be in. Taking on a leadership position will be good for you and good for Lions.

When you are asked to serve in some capacity (and you will be) challenge yourself to accept a leadership role. It's OK to start small - be on the board, become a committee chair - take a risk. Then take advantage of the free training available to you.

I tell you with complete honesty, I have never...ever...been exposed to an organization that takes training leaders as seriously as Lions International and the Lions of Michigan do. These are not organizations that teach swimming by dropping you into a pool of hungry sharks. They recognize that most of us have little leadership experience and approach training most appropriately.

There are workshops, seminars, podcasts, online courses, books, PowerPoint presentations, in person coursework and on-and-on. Many of these resources can be accessed via computer from your own comfy chair at home. Most take less than an hour of your time to go through. Don't know where to start? Don't be afraid to ask for help. Help is readily available from leaders and former leaders in your own club. I'm the first to recognize that I'm not the "brightest bulb on the string" so I make up for my lack of brilliance by asking a lot of questions. Go ahead, ask, it's OK!

Grow into that first position and when asked again, take the next step up. I guarantee your life will change for the better and your club will be the better for your efforts. Seriously, NO ONE WANTS YOU TO FAIL! Putting it another way: EVERYONE WANTS YOU TO SUCCEED! With that kind of support, how can you not?

CLUB NAME _____ Number of Members _____

ARTICLE VII, SECTION 2 of the District 11E1 Constitution and By-Laws: CLUB DELEGATE FORMULA. Each chartered club in good standing in Lions Clubs International and its district shall be entitled in each annual convention of its district to one(1) delegate and one(1) alternate for each ten(10) members, who have been enrolled for at least one year and a day in the club, or major fraction thereof, of said club as shown by the records of the international office on the first day of the month last preceding that month during which the convention is held (March 1, 2022). The major fraction referred to in this section shall be five(5) or more members. Further, full delegate status shall be accorded each Past District Governor who is a member of a Club in this District, independent of the Club delegate quotas herein above specified. Each certified delegate present in person shall be entitled to cast one(1) vote only for each office to be filled by, and one(1) vote only on each question submitted to, the respective convention. Unless otherwise specified herein, the affirmative vote of a majority of delegates voting on any question shall be the act of the convention. All eligible delegates must be members in good standing of a club in good standing in this district. Delinquent dues may be paid and good standing acquired up to fifteen(15) days prior to the close of credential certification (12 noon, Saturday, April 22, 2023)

District 11-E1 Nominations

It is time to consider nominations for our spring District Convention for the position of 2nd Vice District Governor to serve in the 2023-2024 Lions year beginning July 1.

If you are interested in running for this position or know a Lion who would be great as a district leader, you can look up the nomination procedure and rules, as well as qualifications on our district website, <u>http://www.milions11e1.org/</u> You will find the Constitution and Bylaws off the INFO tab on the website home page, then the 5th link down on the next page, under District Resources heading. Go to page 6-7 of the constitution for Article 2, Nominations.

This will outline how to make your nomination. Please have all nominations turned in to myself, and to the District Secretary, no later than Wednesday, February 15 ^{at} 5 pm. This is over 60 days prior to the April 22 District Convention. Remember, it is also the nominees' responsibility to show compliance with the qualifications required for the office they are seeking, which are listed in the constitution, beginning on page 6.

Here is a portion of the constitution concerning nominations: Section 3. FIRST AND SECOND VICE DISTRICT GOVERNOR ELECTION PROCEDURES. Any member of a club in the district seeking the office of first or second vice district governor shall file his/her intention to so run in writing with the Nominating Committee at least sixty (60) days prior of the opening session of the District Convention, with copies to the Cabinet Secretary and Multiple District Executive Secretary and furnish evidence of his/her compliance with the qualifications for said office set out in the International Constitution and By-Laws. The Nominating Committee shall place in nomination at the district convention the names of all candidates so qualified. If none are so received and/or so qualified, then, but then only, nominations for the office may be made from the floor. Each candidate shall be allowed one nominating speech of no more than five (5) minutes duration, and one seconding speech of no more than three (3) minutes duration
