

"Service is Music for the Soul"

That's my theme this year. I love the good feelings I get after working on a service project. Fund raisers don't do it for me as much as being able to say "I did a good thing today. I helped someone." In fact, that is the thing that keeps me in Lions. There are Lions Clubs I call "check writing clubs." They raise money and then write checks, giving their funds to the state and national projects. Don't get me wrong - those projects are important and need Lion's donations. But to me, writing a check doesn't give the same feeling as pitching in to help someone.

And there are other, real, benefits to serving local needs. An



important one is using a local service project to encourage volunteerism. I wrote last month about the "serial" volunteer - the person who is willing to work on Lions projects but is not willing to join the club. While that may sound undesirable, it can be a real advantage. A reliable cadre of volunteers allows a small club to take on large projects. Bigger projects make a bigger impact on our community which, in turn, creates more media "buzz." The buzz makes folks take notice and wonder about the great Lions organization. That allows you to "soft-sell" the virtues of Lionism and encourage membership.

I've seen prospective volunteers scared away because a well-meaning Lions member holds a membership blank up and does the hard sell about joining. Not every volunteer is a potential member but will come back to volunteer again and again if they feel good about the job we ask them to do. I've also seen the opposite occur. At the international convention in Boston earlier this month I witnessed what can happen if you make volunteering spiritually rewarding. After ten years - yes, ten years - of volunteering at LCI conventions, that volunteer was sworn in as a Lions member to the cheers of eleven thousand Lions.

So, when you coax a non-member to volunteer for one of your club's service projects you have a responsibility to make that service project enjoyable and, more importantly, spiritually rewarding. After all, service is music for the soul and you want everyone's soul to sing at the end of the day.

MIDLAND LIONS ANNOUNCE 2023-2024 ROGER MAIER SCHOLARSHIP WINNER

The Midland Lions Club, working through the Midland Area Community Foundation, has awarded the Roger Maier Scholarship to Jamie Bacon. She is a Saginaw Valley University graduate student from Midland and a 2019 graduate of Bullock Creek High School. Bacon will receive \$3,000 to assist her in achieving a Master's degree. [Roger Maier was a mathematics teacher and coach at Northeast Middle School in Midland for 32 years. It was his bequest that established this scholarship.]

Bacon, who earned her bachelor's degree from SVSU, has already earned more than half the credits needed for her Master's degree. She will also earn her Special Educational credentials and she has earned a 3.947 GPA while doing so.

She credits her pursuit of a Learning Disabilities certification to the fact that she, herself, was diagnosed as having dyslexia as a third grader. She believes that she can pay forward the benefits she received as a youngster by empowering others to learn to read and write via untraditional ways. Bacon is appreciative of the scholarship because it will help her become Orton-Gillingham certified, which is a program used to help students with dyslexia learn to read and write.
