Fellow Lions,


All of you who have participated in a KidSight screening, know how important those screenings are to insure that children who have vision problems are identified and referred to eye doctors. Often children with vision problems do not know that they have problems because the way they see now is the way they have always seen. Only through screening can these problems be detected and referred to an eye doctor. For example, children whose eyes don't line up properly can lose their 3D vision for good if they are not diagnosed and treated before age five. Also, children who cannot focus on both the blackboard and their desks at school will find it hard to learn. Both of these kinds of problems can be detected through KidSight screening. Once the problems are detected, parents need to take the child to the eye doctor to treat the problem. KidSight Central Office follows up for children who need treatment and monitors whether they get it. Local Lions Clubs can help with money for parents who cannot afford treatment for their children. To me, this seems like the essence of Lionism, saving sight and helping children. What could be better? I hope you and your club will continue to support KidSight with screenings in your area and contributions to the District Sight and Hearing Fund.

Our KidSight cameras have finally arrived. They are easy to use to screen both children and adults. We are still working on integrating the cameras, computers, and printers and developing a complete instruction manual so that many lions will be able to easily screen children's vision. No experts required. All systems should be up and running next week. Screening requires a number of forms for the children and for KidSight Central Office as well as ink for the printers. We will also need to buy insurance for the cameras and to save some money for their eventual replacement. So please include contributions to the District Sight and Hearing Fund to meet those needs in your club's gifts this year.


One of the things that I promised the Lions Clubs International Foundation when I asked for the money to buy the cameras was that we would screen 3,500 children, ages 1 to 5 years old, and this year. To accomplish that, almost every club will need to schedule KidSight screenings. I hope we will be able to keep all three cameras doing screenings more than once a week. In order for your club to get started with a screening, you need to call PCC Lion Janalee McClure (213-689-1321 or janalee@riverview.net) to get a session number and find out how to set up your screening. If your club is in Lake, Oceana, or Newaygo County, schedule your camera through Lion Janalee. If your club is in Isabella, Midland, or Clare County, schedule your camera through me, DG Lion John, (989-772-1852 or john.monahan@cmich.edu). If your club is in Montcalm, Mecosta, or Osceola County,

call either Lion Janalee or me. If your club is in Leelanau, Grand Traverse, Benzie, Manistee, or Wexford County, call PDG Lion Dan Gibbons (231-889-4870 or <u>dgibbons4870@charter.net</u>).

To use the camera, look through the screen and line up the eyes. You will see one of 3 pictures:



Adjust your distance from too far or too near to just right. Then you will see a gray screen with the child's eyes and a squarish figure with a segmented circle inside located between the eyes. One segment of the circle will be lighter than the others. If you are at the right distance and steady, the lighter segment will rotate around the circle.



After about a second of holding still, the screening will be complete and you will see a recommendation for the child:



This one says the child cannot focus up close, hyperopia, and may have difficulty seeing in 3D, anisometropia gaze. The recommendation is for a complete eye exam, by an eye doctor, optometrist or ophthalmologist. From there you press the screen and print the outcome of the screening so that the parent can know immediately. Then complete some paper work and on to the next child. I hope you will have a chance to screen some children yourself. It's fun and very rewarding.

Nomination Procedures

Lions who wish to run for a district office (Governor, 1st VDG, 2nd VDG or Lions of Michigan Foundation Trustee) are reminded to send in their intent letters by <u>Monday, January 30, 2012.</u> The letter should come from the club's secretary, signed by the club president indicating the club's support and sent to the persons indicated below. If you have any questions, please contact the Nominations Chair who is listed below.

Nomination Procedures:

Any qualified member of a club in the district seeking the office of District Governor, 1st Vice-District or 2nd Vice-District Governor shall file his/her intention to so run in writing with the (1) Nominating Committee at least sixty (60) days prior to the opening session (**March 30, 2012**) of the District Convention, with copies to the (2) Cabinet Secretary and (3) Multiple District Executive Secretary and furnish evidence of his/her compliance with the qualifications for said office set out in the International Constitution and By-Laws. The Nominating Committee shall place in nomination at the district convention the name(s) of all candidate(s) so qualified. If none are so received and/or so qualified, then, but then only, nominations for the office may be made from the floor. A candidate shall be allowed one nominating speech of no more than five (5) minutes duration, and one seconding speech of no more than three (3) minutes duration.

Nominations for the office of Trustee of the Foundation shall be written and shall be certified by the President or Secretary of the Nominee's Lions Club as being the act of a majority of the members of the Club, and shall be filed with the District Nominations Committee Chairperson not less than (60) days prior to the convening date of the District Convention **(March 30, 2012)**. The procedure and rules for nominating and electing a trustee of the foundation shall be the same as for District officers, which are indicated in Article 1 of these By-Laws.

NEW WAVE – GMT

The new wave - I phones, I pads, Blackberries, high powered computers and programs are wonderful changes to the technological world. They improve our quality of life and speed up our communications. We desire to possess them but some of us are concerned about how to best use them.

In the Lions world new programs such as GMT or GLT sound technical and we are skeptical of how effective they can be and how to go about implementing these services. MERLO is out and this new high tech GMT/GLT - Global Membership Team/Global Leadership Team, is in. The purpose of these programs is to aid Lions in developing membership and leadership in their clubs.

We have been browbeaten about membership for over 20 years. Every few years LCI comes out with a new approach to solve these problems in trying to keep Lionism alive. Yes! To keep Lions Clubs alive. Lions International has had four straight years of membership growth. The picture, however, is skewed to the Far East – China, India, etc. Lion's membership in the U.S. and especially in Michigan is falling rapidly. Last year, Michigan Lions membership was down 435 Lions from the previous July 1, 2010. District 11 E1 was down 21 members. It may not seem like many until you examine statistics for the last 10 years and realize that we have been losing on the average of 20 members a year. In the last 10 years, our membership has gone from 1535

to 1317 and is continuing to fall. The Michigan Lions Council of Governors is considering reducing our 10 Michigan Districts to 6 or 8 because of a loss of membership. In District 11 E1, we have lost 4 clubs since 1983 and only developed one new club in that time frame. We are in danger of losing several more this year.

The average age of a Michigan Lion is in the 50's. However, each year, at our Lions Memorial Service we honor 25-35 deceased Lions. They do not replace themselves. We are getting older; we are losing members, and clubs. When this happens we lose our ability to meet the goal of our founder, Melvin Jones, TO SERVE.

This new program GMT/GLT must be embraced by all Lions to make it work. Let's Get Started:

- 1. Lead the way in developing new leadership in your club for the local and District level. The future of Lionism and service to our communities is vital.
- 2. Membership is KEY! High profile your Membership Chair. Have a membership report at every meeting. The key to new membership is "Just Ask." Utilize the resources of your new GMT District Coordinator, if you need help.
- 3. Set a minimum goal of + 1 member over your starting membership of July 1, 2011. (More is great!)
- 4. Retention: We are losing Lion members!! Make meetings fun and interesting. We need to use the talents of ALL our members.

BURNOUT is our worse enemy. We need to take control of the situation.

- 5. Reorganize your club. Don't always do everything the same way (Variety brings new ideas.) Change club leaders on a regular basis to bring in new ideas and develop club leadership.
- 6. LIONS Lively individuals offering needed services to their communities. What is a community without a Lions Club to serve it???

The Global Membership and the Global Leadership Teams District Coordinators are here to serve you. Use their talents and resources. Let's make the District GROW.

Hearing Aid Assistance


As the district and state chairperson of the Hearing Committee, I need to know how many people each club has assisted in obtaining hearing aids and the club policy. Include in the information the club name, club hearing chairperson, sex and age of recipient of the hearing aid(s).

Don't forget that the club must sponsor the individual who is requesting hearing aid(s). The club's responsibility is to help pay for the cost of the hearing evaluation and the fitting of the hearing aids. The fees should not exceed \$150 per ear. Then the club requests an application from Chad McCann at Lions of Michigan Service Foundation. The applicant completes the application and takes it with them to the audiologist for completion of their part of the application. The applicant must have proof of income, insurance, and a medical clearance. After the application is completed it is returned to the club. The club signs it and sends it to Lion Gayle Morlock, district chair. The district chair will review the application for completeness and then sign it and send it to the Lions of Michigan Service Foundation district trustee (PDF Jim Chipman or PDG Dan Gibbons) who will sign it and forward it to Chad McCann to complete the process.

The other is fewer copies printed which will be explained next. I have changed the way labels are prepared in the state office. There is a column in the data I download from Lions International's website labeled "Valid Address." I removed all of the addresses marked "invalid." As a result, fewer magazines were printed and mailed. It's not prudent to send magazines that are going to be returned because the Post Office charges a 50¢ fee for each piece that is "undeliverable as addressed." If someone isn't receiving their magazine, please tell them to check with their Club Secretary. If LCI has an incorrect address, the Club Secretary needs to correct it. They may also contact LCI's Membership and Statistics Department at 630-571-5466 to report the change. I have attached the list of

addresses which were marked as non-valid in LCI's database. Please look it over and contact club secretaries who need to update information.
