

SEPTEMBER MESSAGE 1ST VDG AL ROESELER

In August I was invited by Leader Dogs for the Blind to intend an informational program at their facility in Rochester Hills Michigan. Prior to the meeting I thought I had a pretty good idea of what Leader Dogs was and how it worked.

I was not wrong in what I knew, Leader Dogs does provide guide dogs for vision impaired individuals, but there is so much more! They run a puppy breeding program to up the odds that their dogs have the traits necessary for success in the program. Volunteers house the breeding dogs, and raise their litters for the first 7 weeks. After 7 weeks the puppies are placed with puppy raiser volunteers who raise the dogs for about 1 year. After that year they are returned to Leader dogs to be trained for 2-3 months and then matched with a client and then they are trained as a team for twenty five days at the Rochester facility. Leader dogs also participates in a highly successful prison program. Selected inmates are allowed to raise the dogs in the prison. It is a win-win situation, benefiting not only the dogs, but the inmates as well.

Even with all the volunteers, and a donation from Purina of 50,000 pounds of dog food to Leader Dogs every year, the out the door cost of training a dog and client team is \$39,000 and the **Clients pay nothing!**As part of our program we heard testimonials from several clients. They each described the depression and fear associated with losing their sight. The biggest fear is the loss of independence and having to rely on others for basic needs particularly mobility. Getting a dog, returned them to an independence and freedom that made their life whole again. We got the opportunity to do a blindfold walk with a dog. For me it was an eye-opening experience. It lasted only a few minutes and at the end I was able to take my blindfold off, but it was a leap of faith to put your trust in a dog to keep you safe.

Another thing I did not know about Leader Dogs is that they have clients not only around this country, but around the world as well. I did not know they do orientation and mobility (white cane) training on their campus, as well as running a teen summer camp program.

Our informational program included Lions from many different states. As Lions are biggest contributors to Leader Dogs, I was pleased to see MD11 (Michigan's Lower Peninsula) at the top of the list of contributors. Our District 11-E1 however, was 7th out of the 10 districts that make up Multi District 11. When your club considers its donations to state projects this year, I hope you can find a few extra dollars for this incredible organization, and bring your checks to the fall conference on September 16th. 




